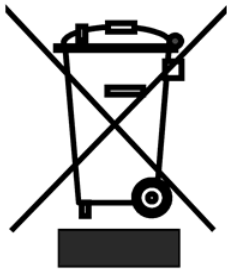

Chapter 1 Introduction

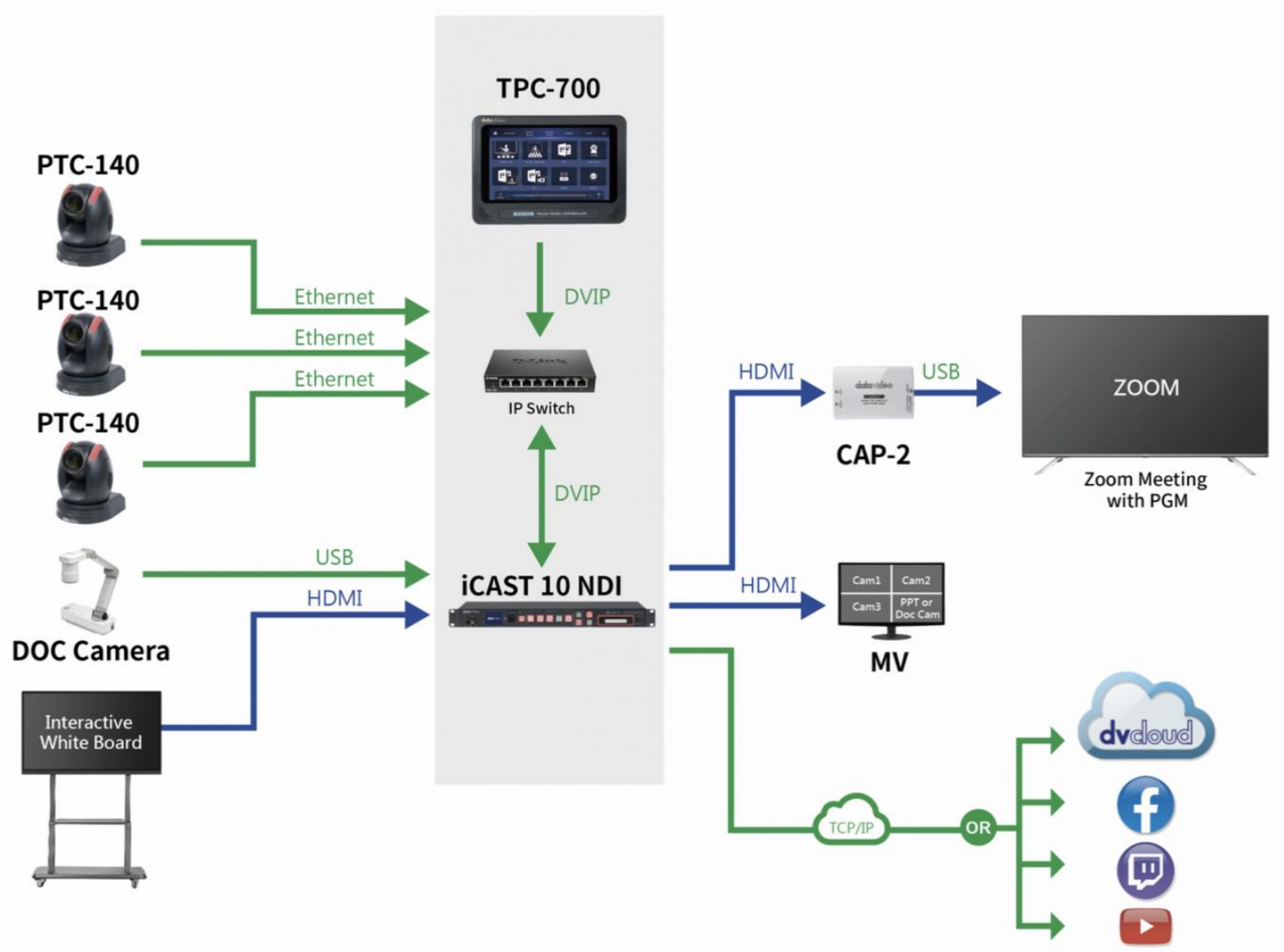
The iCast 10NDI five channel all-in-one streaming switcher is designed to stream and record videos with a variety of video resolutions, formats and bitrates in different scenarios. The streaming switcher features one SDI and four HDMI video inputs as well as a USB port for connecting a document camera. External audio sources can be delivered to iCast 10NDI via the XLR balanced or RCA unbalanced audio ports. In addition, it can be used as a video IP switcher allowing you to operate the device from a remote location.

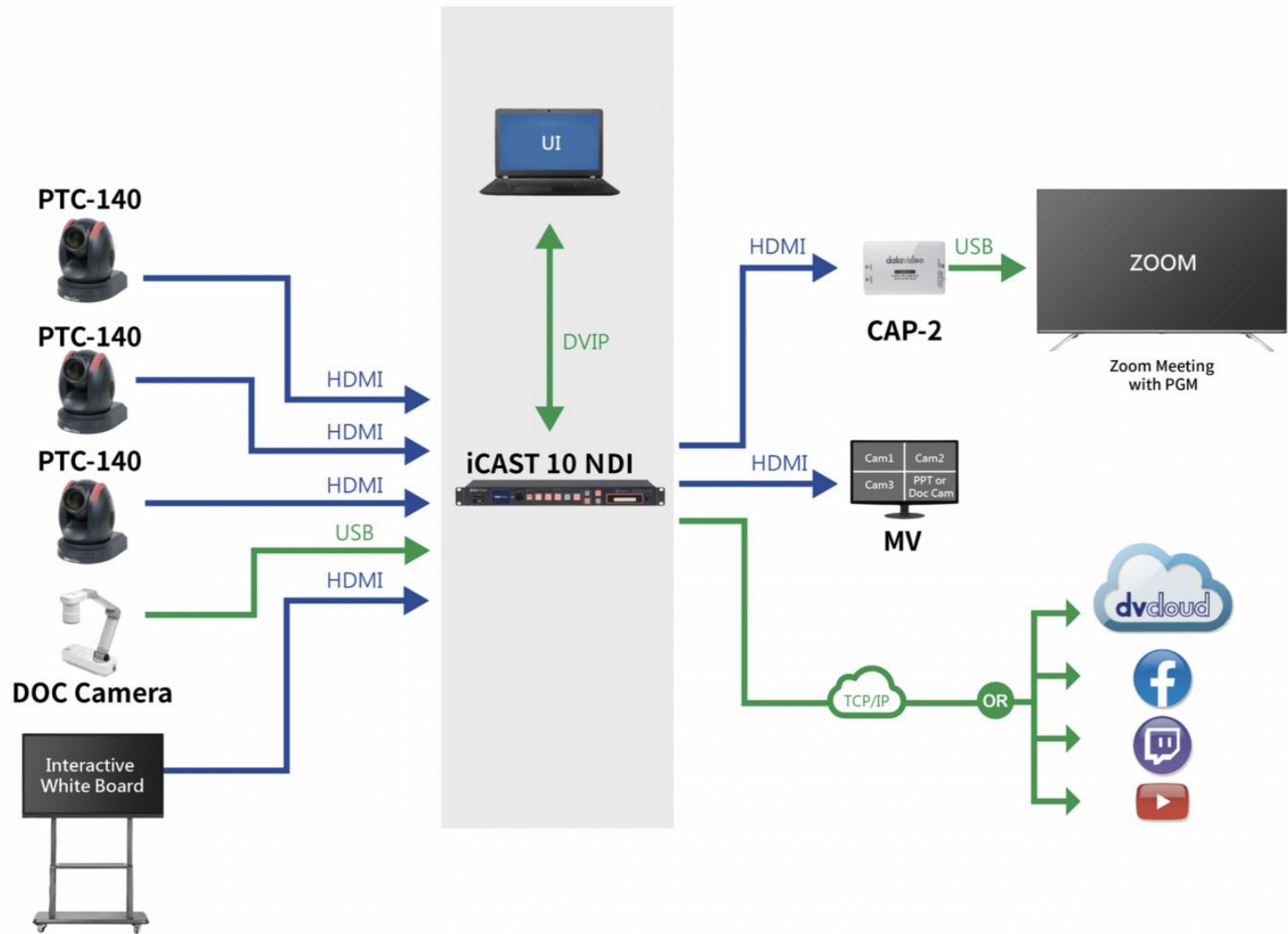
The videos are recorded to an external 2.5" HDD/SSD inserted into the disk slot found on the front panel. The hard disk can be formatted to FAT or exFAT as they allow you to record the video into a single file exceeding 4 GB.

1.1 Features

- Switching the PGM view by directly pushing the buttons on the front panel
- Viewing real-time recording and streaming status on the 2" LCD display
- 6 channel ISO recording (channels 1-5 and PGM)
- Custom bitrates for streaming and recording
- H.264 Encoder

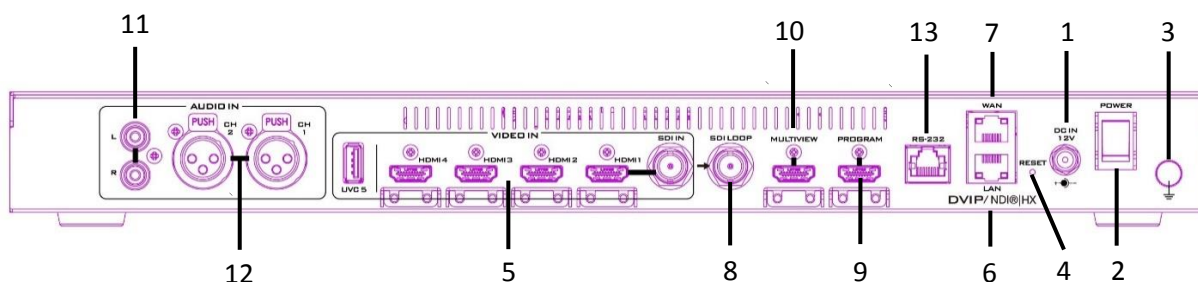




Chapter 2 Connections and Controls

In this chapter, we will discuss various port connections at the rear of the device, button functions and securing a 2.5" SSD/HDD in a disk enclosure.

2.1 Rear Panel

1. DC IN (12V)

DC in socket connects the supplied 12V PSU. The connection can be secured by screwing the outer fastening ring of the DC In plug to the socket.



2. Power Switch

The power switch **ONLY** powers ON the device's LCD display on which the OSD menu will be shown after the boot is complete.

Note: After you've turned on the power switch, press the power button on the front panel to enable the button functions.



3. Ground

When connecting this unit to any other component, make sure that it is properly grounded by connecting this terminal to an appropriate point. When connecting, use the socket and be sure to use wire with a cross-sectional area of at least 1.0 mm².



4. Reset Hole

Insert a needle into the reset hole to press and hold the internal button. The device should reset itself after a few seconds.



5. Video Input Ports

The video input ports consist of one 3G/HD/SDI-SDI port, four HDMI 1.4 ports, one USB 3.0 port and two Ethernet ports (LAN and WAN ports) and can be assigned to input video channels in different combinations.

The available video source types for each input video channel are summarized below:

Input Video Channel 1: SDI, HDMI, IP Stream, NDI and WebRTC

Note: SDI is only available on Channel 1. Pressing the Input 1 button on the front panel allows you to switch between SDI and HDMI video source types.

Input Video Channel 2: HDMI, IP Stream, NDI and WebRTC

Input Video Channel 3: HDMI, IP Stream, NDI and WebRTC

Input Video Channel 4: HDMI, IP Stream, NDI and WebRTC

Input Video Channel 5: UVC

Note: The USB 3.0 port (UVC 5) is designed for connecting a document camera.

See [Section 5.2 Source](#) for assigning an appropriate video source type to input channels.



6. LAN Port

The LAN port allows you to connect your iCast 10NDI to any networks. The LAN port is a bidirectional stream port capable of accepting video streams from multiple video sources that are on the same network as iCast 10NDI or streaming videos from iCast 10NDI to local and remote client devices. Source and destination devices can be any NDI, IP or WebRTC devices.

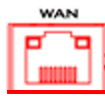
The LAN port allows the user to establish direct connection between the PC and the iCast 10NDI in order to access the Web UI for accessing the device's internal stream and record settings.

See [Section 5.1 Network Connection and Device Search](#) for instructions on how you can establish direct connection with iCast 10NDI.

See [Section 5.2 Source](#) for assigning an NDI, IP stream or WebRTC video source type to input channels. Please note

that the sum of video bitrates of all video channels should not exceed 32 Mbps when set to the NDI or IP stream video source type. This means that if the channel video bitrate is set to 10 Mbps, then up to three input channels can be simultaneously set to the NDI or IP stream video source type; if the channel video bitrate is set to 16 Mbps, then only two input channels can be simultaneously set to the NDI or IP stream video source type. For example, if channels 1, 2 and 3 are assigned of NDI or IP stream video sources and the sum of video bitrates exceeds 32 Mbps when channel 4 is included, you can only set channel 4 to other video source types (channel 5 is designed solely for UVC input).

For output stream setup, see [Section 5.5](#) or [Chapter 6](#).



7. WAN Port

The WAN port is basically another alternative to the LAN port. The two network ports have the same functionalities but the LAN port has priority over the WAN when they are in use at the same time.



8. SDI Loop OUT

The **Loop OUT** port allows you to deliver the video source connected to the SDI IN port to the connected SDI destination device such as an SDI monitor.



9. Program OUT

The program OUT port allows you to connect an HDMI monitor for displaying the program video which can be selected using the channel buttons on the front panel.



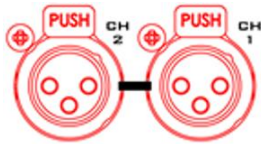
10. Multiview OUT

The Multiview OUT port allows you to connect an HDMI monitor for displaying a Multiview of input video channels. The iCast 10NDI offers four different Multiview layouts, see [Section 5.7 PGM](#) for more information about selecting and setting these layouts.



11. RCA Unbalanced Audio Input

Connects an unbalanced analog audio source (stereo).



12. XLR Balanced Audio Input

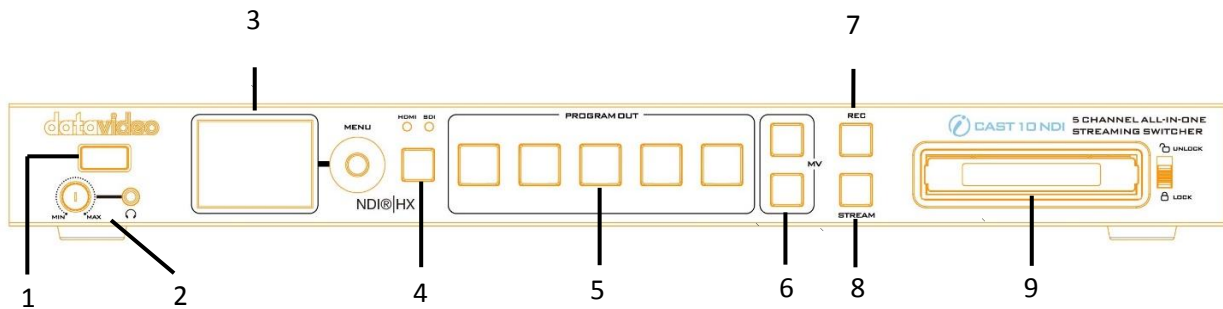
Two XLR Balanced Audio Input channels.



13. RS-232 Port

Connect to the RS-232 port for remote control. See [Appendix 1](#) for RS-232 pinout information.

2.2 Front Panel

1. Power Button

Press the power button to enable the button functions after you've turned on the power switch which can be found on the rear panel.



2. Headphone Jack

Headphone jack accepts the mini jack plug of the stereo headphone type. The headphone volume can be adjusted using the volume control knob.



3. LCD Screen / Menu Browsing Knob

The OSD menu is shown on the LCD screen. Use the menu browsing knob to browse the menu and select a particular option.



4. Input 1 Button

Input source switch button for channel 1 which is an SDI/HDMI selectable input port. The LED indicators indicate the currently active port.



5. Channel Buttons for Program OUT

Depending on your program layout, press the channel buttons to select your program video sources.

Note: The available program layouts are Quad View, Full Screen, POP, Side by Side and PIP, which can be selected using the OSD menu.



6. Multiview Layout Selection Buttons

Press the corresponding button to select either a 2x2 or 4x1 Multiview layout.

The fourth quadrant of the Multiview layout is shared by channels 4 and 5 and can be changed by pressing the respective MV button.



7. Record Button

Press the record button to activate program recording. The record settings can be found on the web UI.



8. Stream Button

Press the stream button to activate program streaming. The stream settings can be found on the web UI.

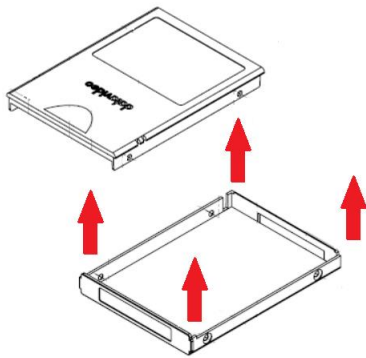


9. Hard Disk Drive Slot

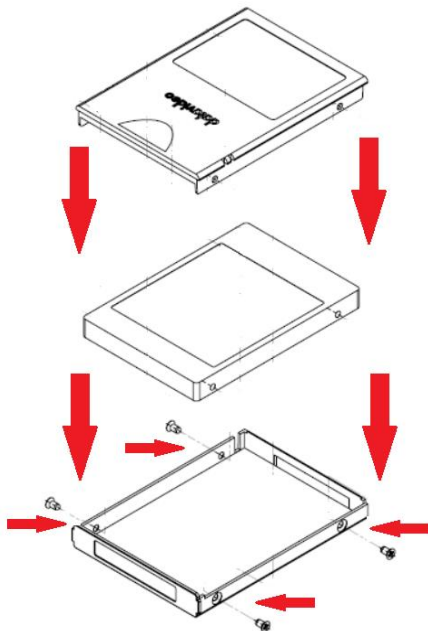
Insert the assembled hard disk into this slot. See the next section for disk assembly.

2.3 Disk Assembly

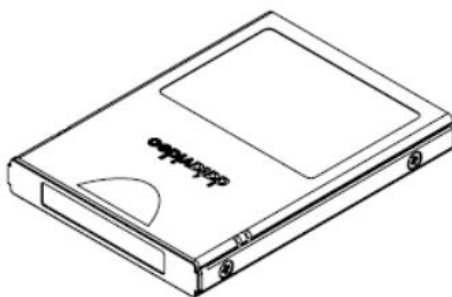
Instructions to assemble a 2.5" SSD/HDD in a disk enclosure will be detailed in this section.



1. Lift the cover of the disk enclosure.



2. Reassemble the disk enclosure after placing the SSD/HDD in the enclosure tray. Insert the screws into the holes found on the two sides as shown in the diagram on the left. Fasten the screws to secure the SSD/HDD to the enclosure tray.



3. The 2.5" SSD/HDD assembled in the disk enclosure is shown in the diagram on the left.



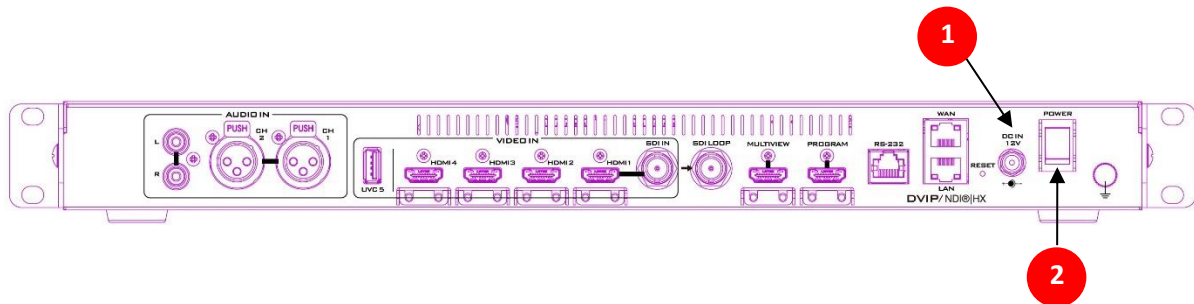
4. Insert the assembled disk enclosure into the disk slot on the front panel then slide the LOCK/UNLOCK switch to the LOCK position. The LED indicator will illuminate as soon as the disk is inserted.

Chapter 3 Preparations

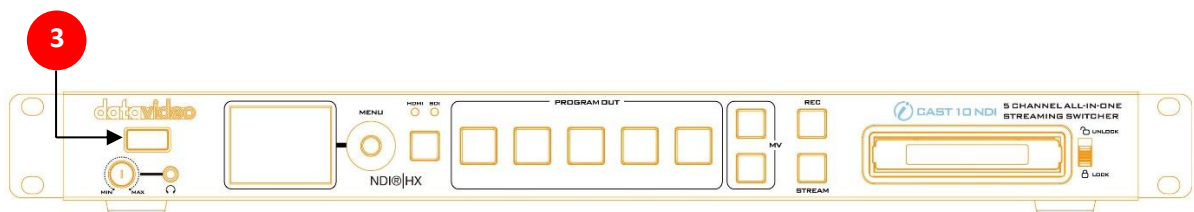
In this chapter, we will describe various essential devices to be connected to iCast 10NDI in order to complete the system setup. If you possess the skills for setting up the production system, feel free to skip this chapter and proceed to [Chapter 4: OSD MENU](#).

3.1 Power

1. Connect the supplied 12V PSU to the DC Power Input on the rear of the iCast 10NDI. The connection can be secured by screwing the outer fastening ring of the DC In plug to the socket.



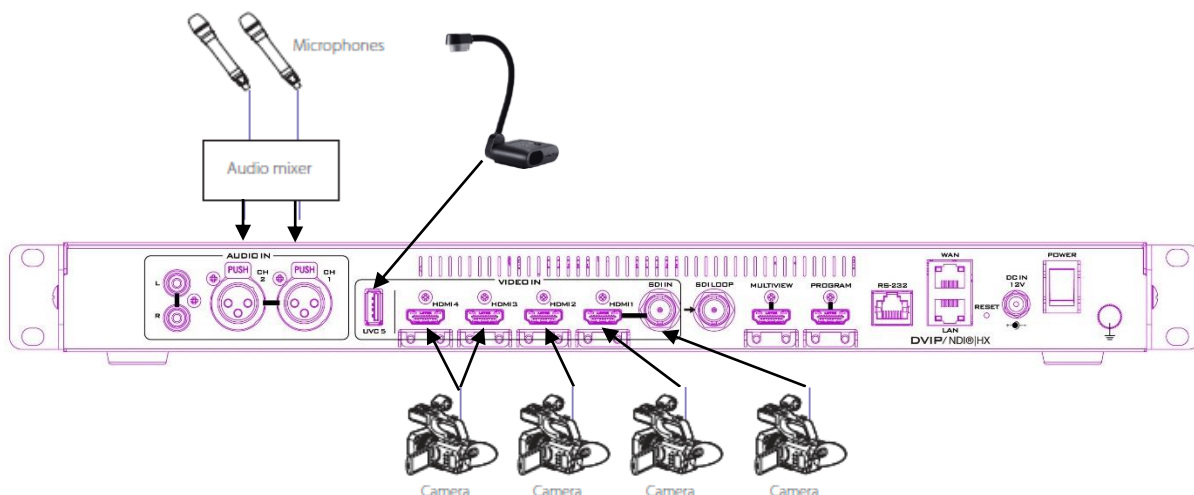
2. Turn ON the power switch to turn ON the 2" LCD screen showing device status and the OSD menu which are described in detail in [Chapter 4](#).



3. Press the power button to turn on the device's button functions.

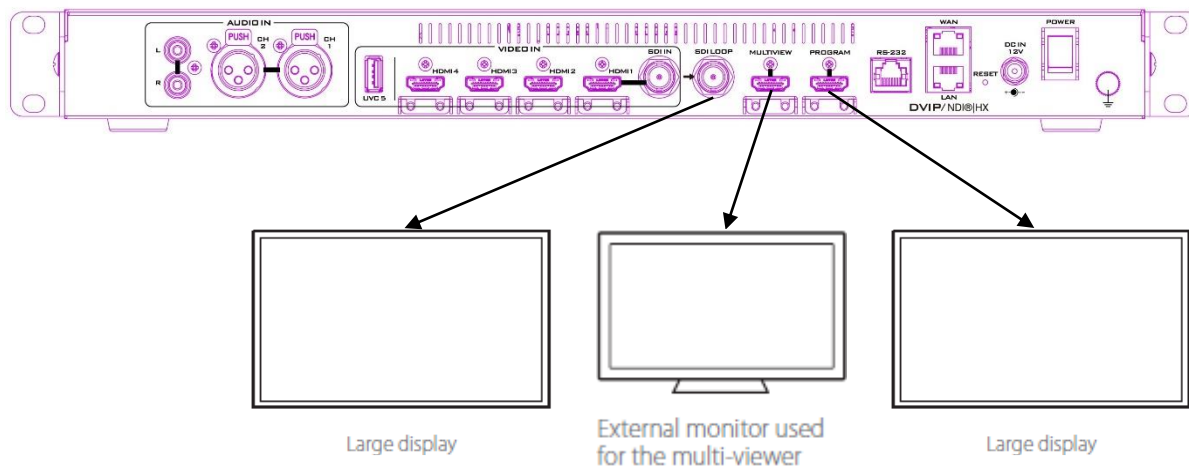
3.2 Connecting Input Devices

Looking at the rear panel of the iCast 10NDI, you should find five input video channels with channel 1 being an only SDI/HDMI selectable channel. Channel 5 or the UVC channel is a USB 3.0 port designed for connecting a document camera. External audio sources such as microphones can be connected to XLR balanced audio input ports.



3.3 Connecting Output Devices

The iCast 10NDI has three video outputs, namely SDI Loop OUT, Program OUT, and Multiview OUT. It is possible to operate the iCast 10NDI with just one or multiple monitors connected as shown in the diagram below.



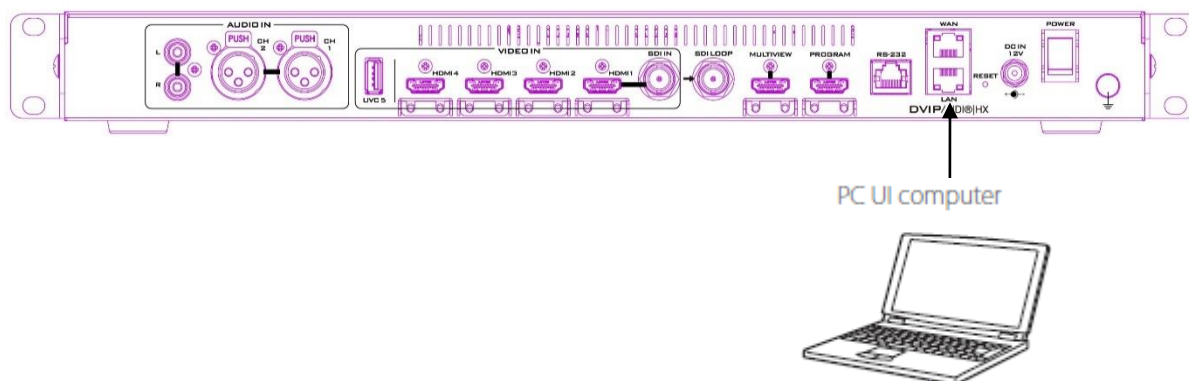
The SDI Loop OUT displays the SDI input video. The Datavideo TLM-170L/V/K/F monitors could be used. The Program OUT displays the channel video (Channels 1 – 5) selected on the front panel of the iCast 10NDI. The Program OUT can also be set to other viewing modes such as quad view, POP, PIP and side by side; see [Section 4.5 Program Layout](#) and [Section 5.7 PGM](#) for details.

The Multiview OUT displays a combination of four channel videos. You can press the corresponding buttons on the front panel to select either a 2x2 or 4x1 multiview layout. See [Section 3.5 Multiview](#) in this chapter for details.

3.4 Network Connections

With the LAN port, the iCast 10NDI can directly communicate with a PC/notebook using a static IP address. The two devices can also communicate across a DHCP network. Please seek the help of an IT specialist for network setup if necessary.

Once the network connection is set up, you will then be able to open the web UI on the PC/notebook and configure and operate the iCast 10NDI accordingly. See [Chapter 5](#) for network setup instructions and descriptions of the Web User Interface.



3.5 Multiview

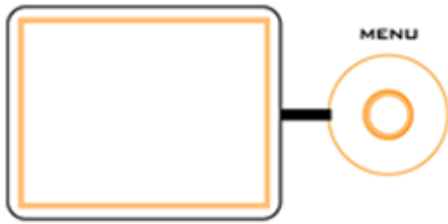
The iCast 10NDI Multiview is supplied from the input connections on the rear panel and displayed on the HDMI monitor connected to the Multiview OUT port. The Datavideo TLM-170L/V/K/F monitors could be used. The iCast 10NDI offers two Multiview layouts. You can press the corresponding buttons on the front panel to select either a 2x2 or 4x1 Multiview layout depicted below.

Note 1: Channels 4 and 5 share the fourth quadrant and can be changed by pressing the respective channel buttons on the front panel.

Note 2: Use Full Screen on the [program out](#) screen if the 4 x 1 layout is selected.

Chapter 4 OSD Menu



The OSD menu allows the user to access certain device settings such as the network settings, the program output frame rate, the program layout, and channel settings. You will be able to reset the device to its factory defaults and enable various program CGs. Furthermore, the stream and record status, firmware version, and disk capacity can be

viewed on the OSD menu.

As you turn on the power switch located at the rear of the iCast 10NDI, the following device information will be displayed on the 2” LCD screen after the device boots up.

4.1 System

In System, you will be allowed to configure the device's network settings, view the device's firmware version and reset the device to its factory defaults.

Network Settings

The iCast 10NDI can be accessed over an existing TCP/IP LAN type network. In Network Settings, you will be allowed to gain direct access to the DHCP and Static IP modes.

Enabling **DHCP** allows the iCast 10NDI to be automatically assigned an IP address upon connection to the DHCP network. If DHCP is disabled, you will have to manually enter the network settings such as the static IP address, subnet mask, default gateway (optional), primary DNS (optional) and secondary DNS (optional).

FW & FPGA Version

In this option, you will be able to view the firmware version as well as the FPGA version on the 2" LCD screen as shown below. The firmware upgrade procedure can be found in [Appendix 2](#) or [Section 5.10 System](#).

If you need to format the inserted hard disk, you can quickly do it from the OSD menu. You can also view the disk capacity which is displayed in MB.

4.3 Program CG

The iCast 10NDI allows you to place multiple textual or graphic layer on top of the video. In **Program CG**, You can enable/disable these CG layers listed as follows:

- **Text:** textual layer
- **Graphic:** still graphic layer
- **Logo:** still logo layer
- **Animation:** animated graphic layer

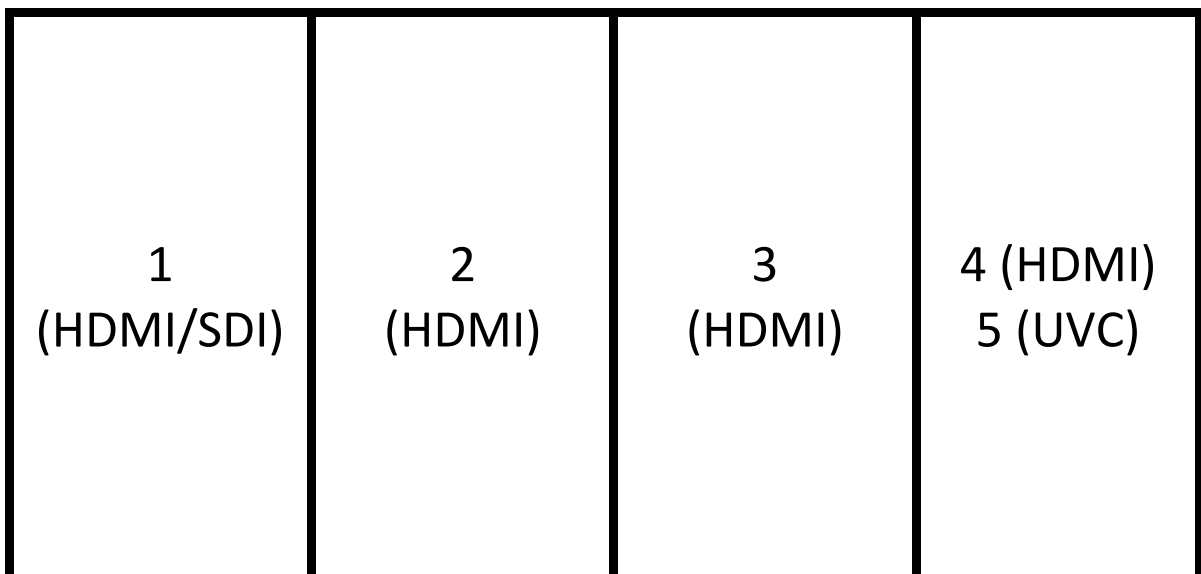
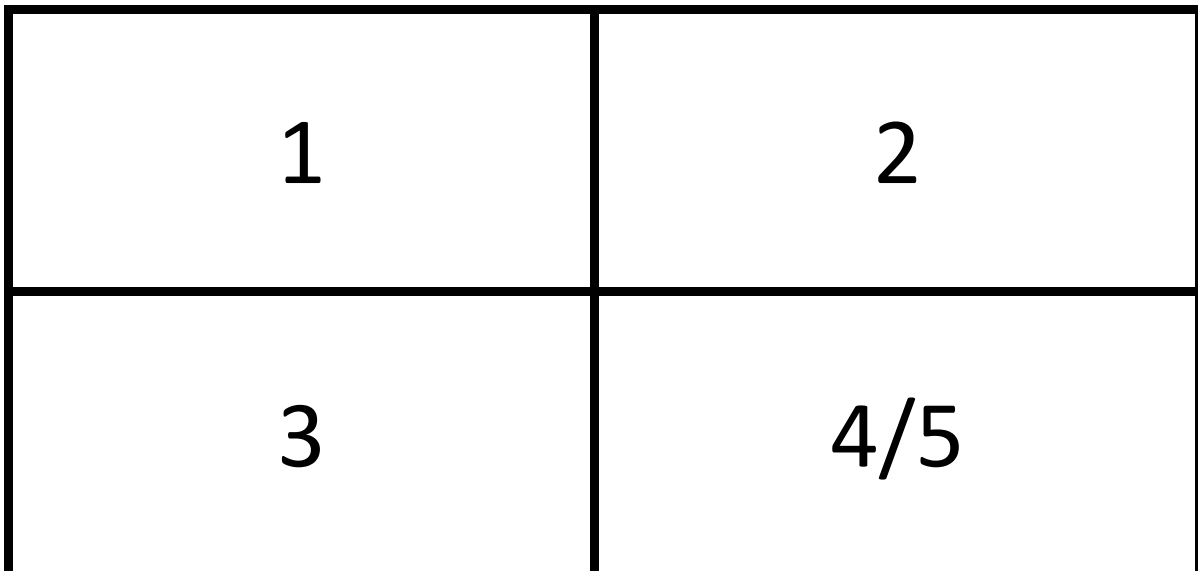
In this option, select a frame rate for the Program OUT video. The available frame rates are 60p, 50p, 30p and 25p.

4.5 Program Layout

The iCast 10NDI's Program OUT is supplied from the input connections on the rear panel. Since a variety of multi-image layouts is available, the HDMI PGM OUT can also be used to monitor video and audio in a number of different configurations. The available Multiview layouts are described below. You can also see [Section 5.7 PGM](#) for configuring and selecting the respective layouts on Web UI.

Quad View

The quad view is either a 2x2 or 4x1 Multiview layout. The fourth quadrant is shared by channels 4 and 5 and can be changed by pressing the corresponding MV button on the front panel.

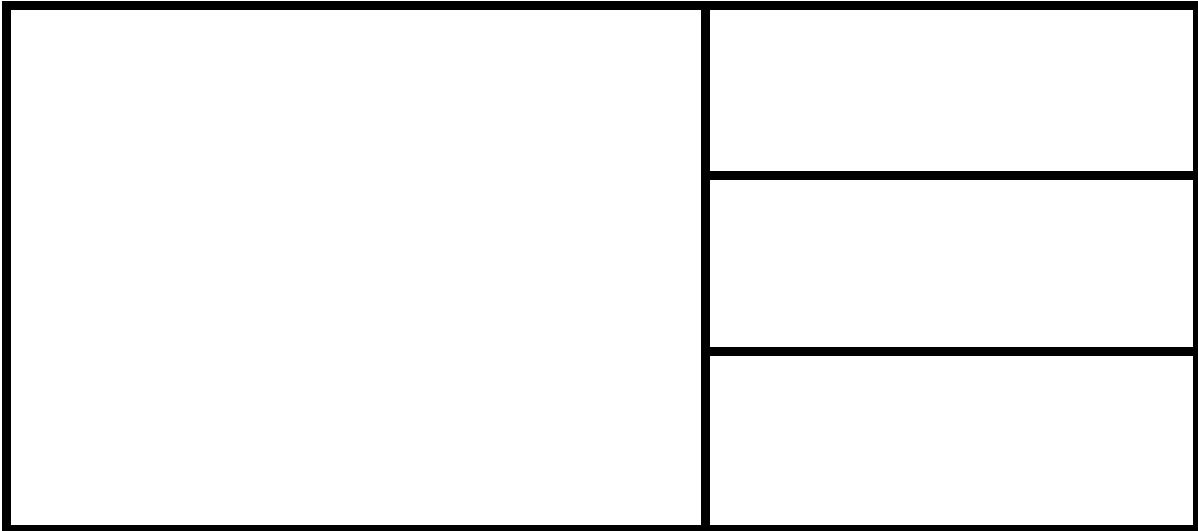


Full Screen

By selecting the full screen mode, only the selected channel video will be displayed on the monitor and the corresponding channel button on the front panel should illuminate red. Unselected channel buttons should illuminate white. You can press the channel buttons on the front panel to switch the program view. The displayed video should take up the entire screen.

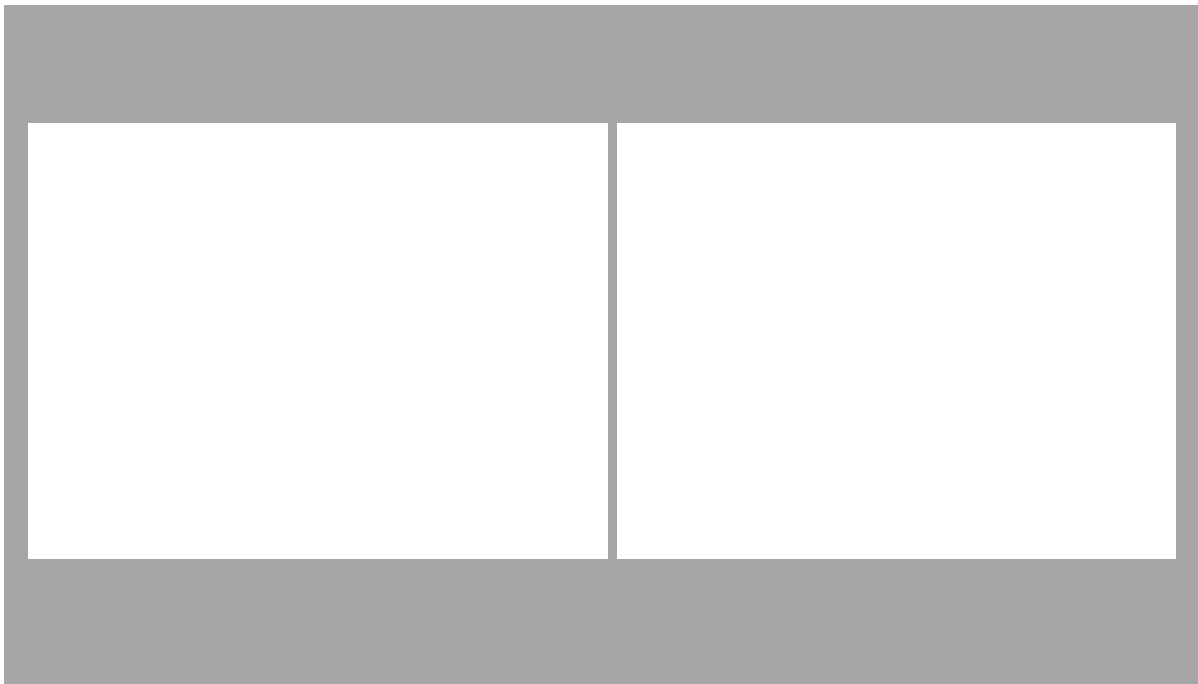
POP

The POP Multiview layout is shown below. Push the channel buttons to switch between video channels.



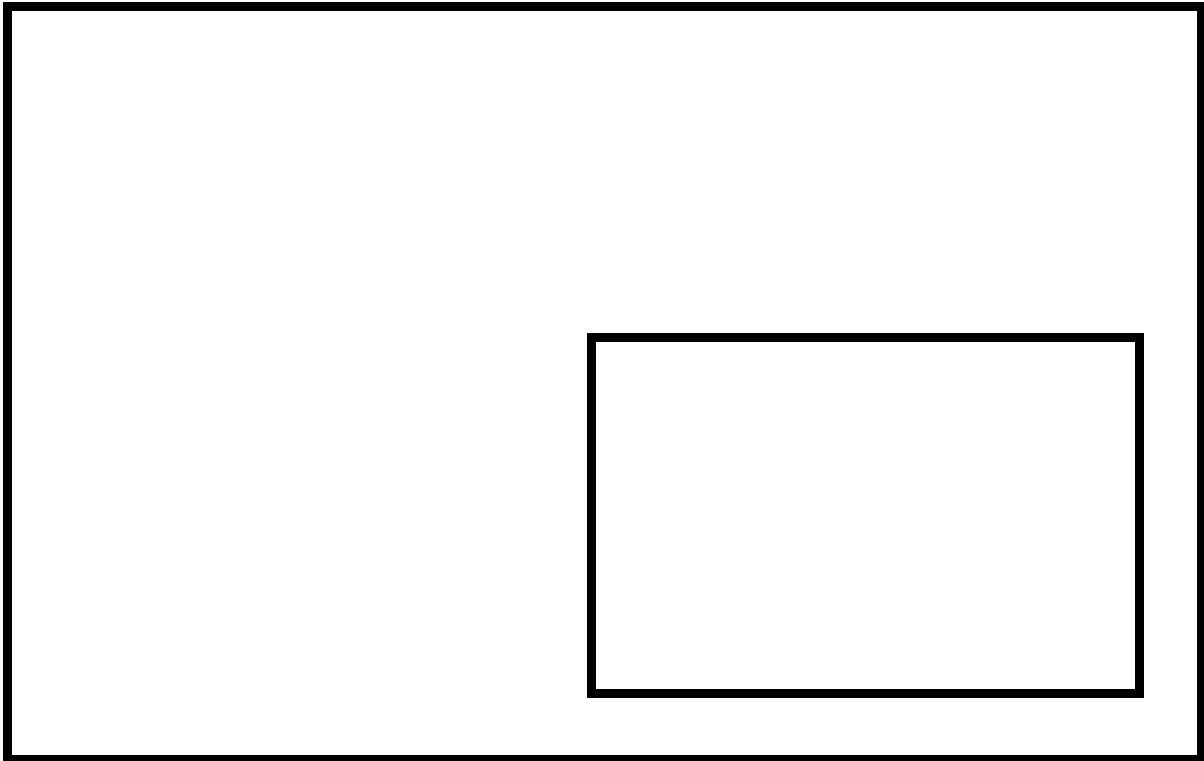
Side by Side

Chapter 5 Web User Interface

This chapter discusses how you can utilize the Web User Interface to configure various settings of your device.

5.1 Network Connection and Device Search

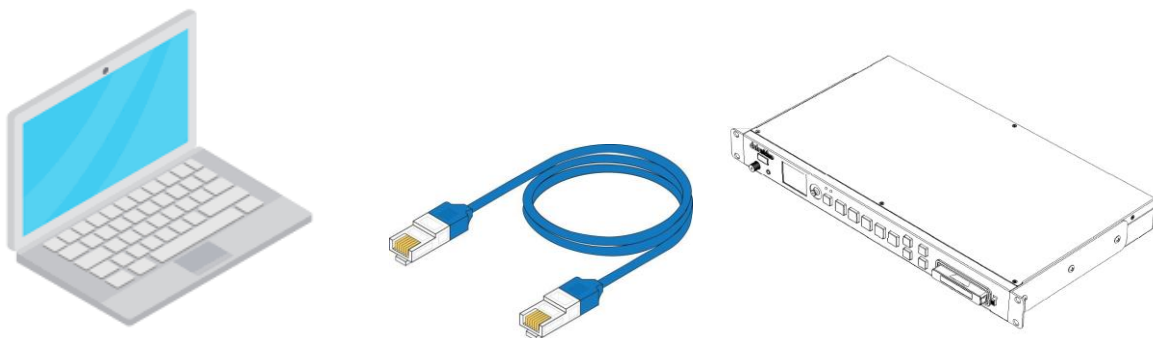
To use the web user interface, you will have to first connect iCast 10NDI to a network via the LAN port. This section shows you how to connect iCast 10NDI to the network with or without a DHCP server, and describes ways to acquire the device's IP address.

Default Fixed IP

When new from the factory, the iCast 10NDI is supplied with a default fixed IP address (**192.168.1.201**) which allows you to establish point-to-point connection with your laptop/PC. The following setup should allow you to log in to the web user interface and initially configure the device's various settings.

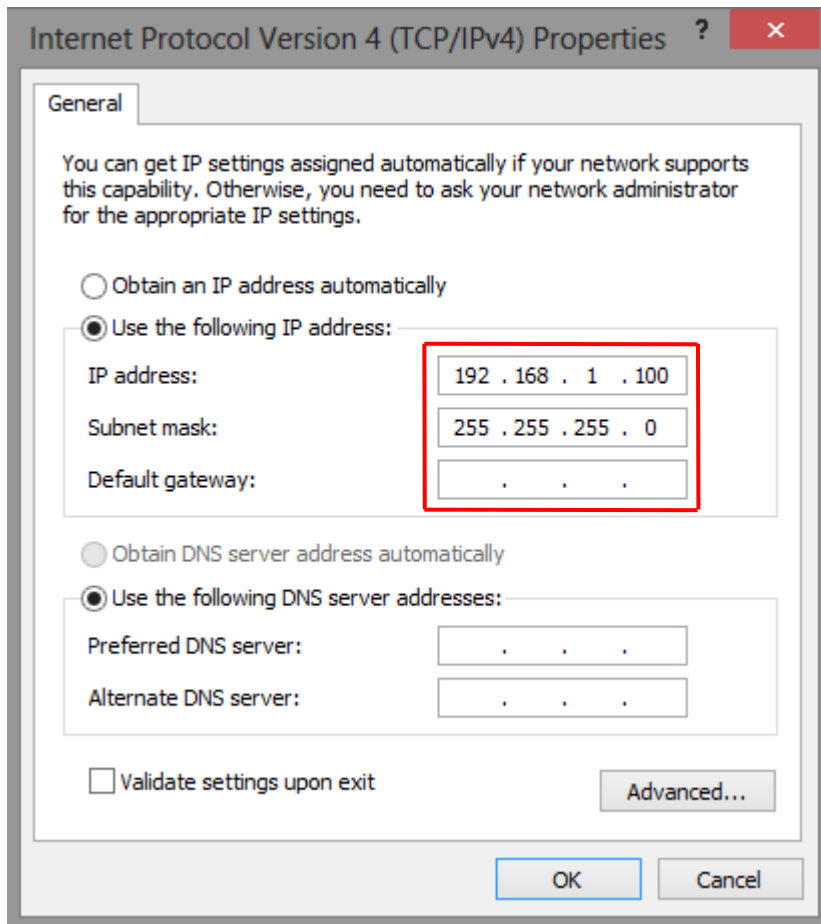
System Requirements:

- **An RJ-45 Ethernet cable**
- **Windows 7/8/10 laptop or PC**
- **iCast 10NDI**
- **IP Finder utility program (downloaded from the product page to the laptop)**

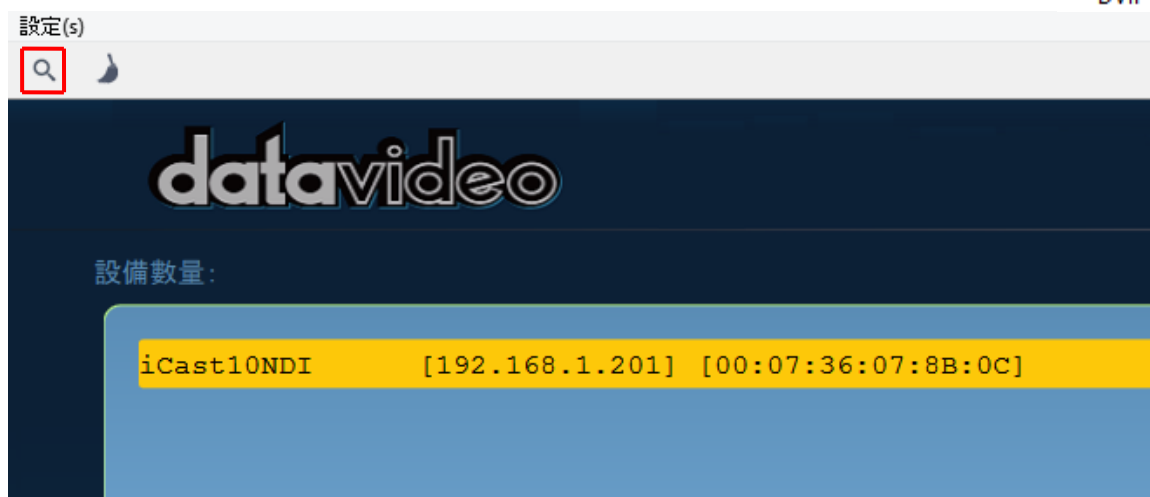


Follow the procedure below to log in to the web user interface:

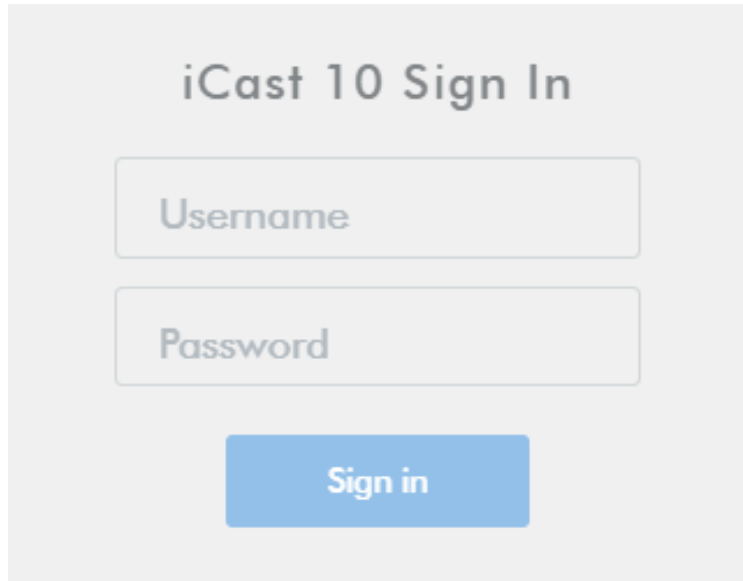
1. Physically connect the Windows laptop's Ethernet port to the iCast 10NDI's LAN port via an Ethernet cable.
2. Turn on the laptop and set it to **static IP setup** within the **Windows Network and Sharing Centre**. In our example, the computer is given the following IP settings so that the computer matches the same IP range as the switcher.



3. Turn on the iCast 10NDI's power and the device should be turned ON in Static IP mode by default (**192.168.1.201**).
4. On the laptop, double click the DVIP Network Configuration Tool icon to open the utility interface.
5. Click the **SCAN** icon at the top left corner to search for the connected iCast 10NDI.



6. Manually enter the iCast 10NDI's IP address into the address bar of a browser on your laptop then hit the **ENTER** button.



7. Enter the login credentials (Username: admin/Password: 000000) to log in to the web UI shown below.

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Brief descriptions of the user interface are provided as follows:

At the top right corner, you will find a drop-down menu in which you can select the interface language. The available languages are English, Traditional Chinese and Simplified Chinese.

Below the interface language drop-down menu, you will find the CPU utilization. Please note that the CPU resource used should never exceed 80%. If exceeded, you will then experience system instability, interrupted operations, audio and video becoming out of sync, and even system crash. We recommend shutting down some applications if you see any of the above-mentioned issues.

In addition, you will also find the UI version number as well as the total frame rate usage. The total frame rate usage indicates the total frame rate of all stream and record channels that are currently in use. The total frame rate usage should not exceed 300. The maximum total frame rate usage is 299 frames.

Click the tabs to gain access to various functionalities of iCast 10NDI. Brief descriptions of the tabs are provided as follows:

Source: View input channel information and configure various video sources ([SDI](#), [HDMI](#), [IP Stream](#), [NDI](#), [WebRTC](#) and [UVC](#)).

Encoder: Set the main and sub encoders.

Record: Configure the two built-in recorders.

Streaming: Configure the two built-in stream servers.

CG: Create textual or graphic layers ([News](#), [Graphic](#), [Logo](#) and [Animation](#)) on the videos.

Multiview: Set the Multiview screen layout.

PGM: Set the screen layout for PGM OUT.

Mixer: Set the volume and delay of various audio sources.

Monitor: Set the HDMI output frame rate and volume of the embedded audio.

System: System settings include [network setting](#), [login credentials](#), [time setting](#), [firmware update](#), [disk formatting](#), [device name](#), [timeout duration](#), [auto stream](#), [reset](#) and [reboot](#).

Note: In **Networking Setting**, you will be allowed to enable/disable DHCP; see the following sections for details on connecting in the respective modes.

Status: View input, record, stream and disk status.

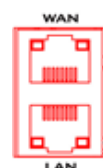
Advanced: Select the video stream source and the encoder for the stream servers.

Connecting to a DHCP Network

In DHCP mode, the iCast 10NDI will be automatically assigned an IP address upon connection to the DHCP network.

Follow the procedure below to scan your DHCP network for iCast 10NDI.

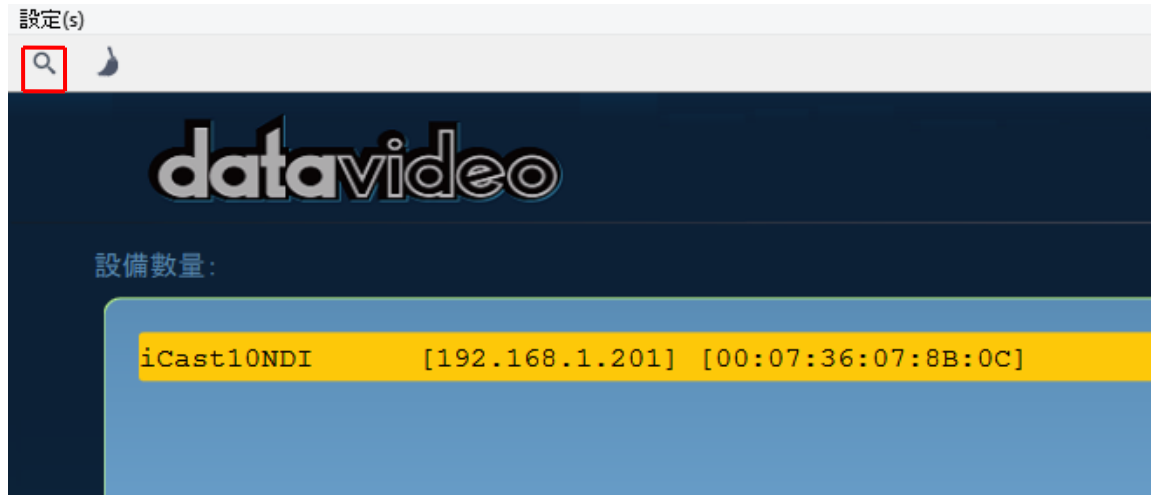
1. Connect the iCast 10NDI's LAN or WAN port to the network via an Ethernet cable.
2. Turn on the iCast 10NDI's power and the device should be turned ON in DHCP.



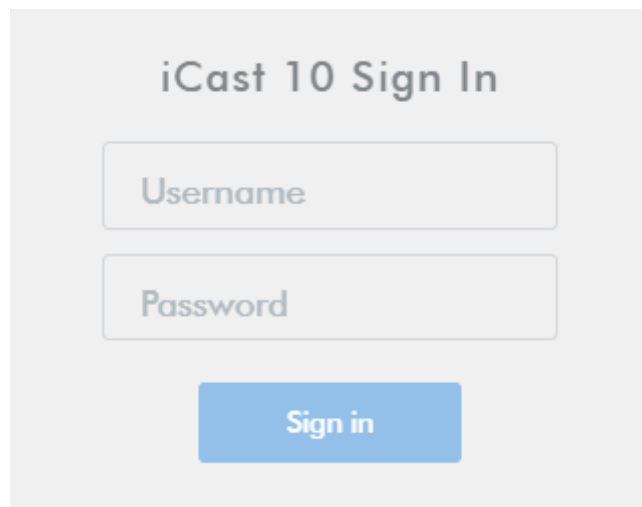


DVIP

3. Connect the laptop to the same network that the iCast 10NDI is connected to and download the free DVIP Network Configuration Tool.
4. Double click the DVIP Network Configuration Tool icon to open the utility interface.
5. Click the **SCAN** icon at the top left corner to start searching for the connected iCast 10NDI.



6. Manually enter the iCast 10NDI's IP address into the address bar of a browser on your PC then hit the **ENTER** button.



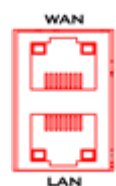
7. Enter the login credentials (Username: admin/Password: 000000) to log in to the web UI.

Connecting to a NON-DHCP Network (Static IP)

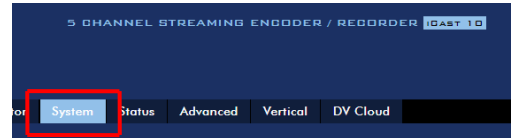
Upon connection to a non-DHCP network, the iCast 10NDI will not be assigned of any IP address. As such it is recommended that you manually assign a fixed IP address to the device or use the default IP address (**192.168.1.201**).

To configure the iCast 10NDI from DHCP to a **static IP**, please follow the steps outlined below:

1. Connect the iCast 10NDI's LAN or WAN port to the network via an Ethernet cable.
2. Turn on the iCast 10NDI's power and the device should be turned ON in DHCP.
3. Search for the iCast 10NDI device according to the method as detailed in the previous DHCP section. Once found, log in to the user interface on the web browser.



4. Open the system page by clicking the “System” tab on the home of the user interface.
5. In the “Network Setting” pane, disable the DHCP mode.
6. You will be allowed to manually enter the static IP address



- Static IP: X.X.X.Y; the first three decimal numbers must be the same as your router or switch. The number Y must be a number not used by any devices connected to the network.
 - Subnet Mask: 255.255.255.0
 - Default Gateway: Z.Z.Z.Z; same as the gateway IP of your router or switch.

Note: Some router may require special gateway IP setting instead of the standard 192.168.1.1. Therefore, you should check the network properties on the PC before switching to the fixed IP mode. For example, some routers have a gateway IP of 192.168.1.254 and as a result, the default gateway and primary DNS fields must also be configured to 192.168.1.254.

 - Primary DNS: Same as the default gateway IP, which, if causing issues, can be changed to 8.8.8.8 or 8.8.8.4 (Public DNS provided by Google).

7. After you’ve set the static IP, you can either establish point-to-point connection with iCast 10NDI on your computer or connect iCast 10NDI to a network with the same IP range.

Tip: If you forget or lose the IP address, you can either reset the device by inserting a needle into the reset hole at the rear panel then push and hold for several seconds until the system starts resetting itself, or you can do the following to reset the network settings.

- Turn off iCast 10NDI.
- Push the **RECORD** and **STREAM** buttons at the same time then turn ON the device power.
- Wait for about five seconds then release the buttons as soon as you see the **RECORD** and **STREAM** button LEDs light up.
- The IP address should be the default IP which is **192.168.1.201**.

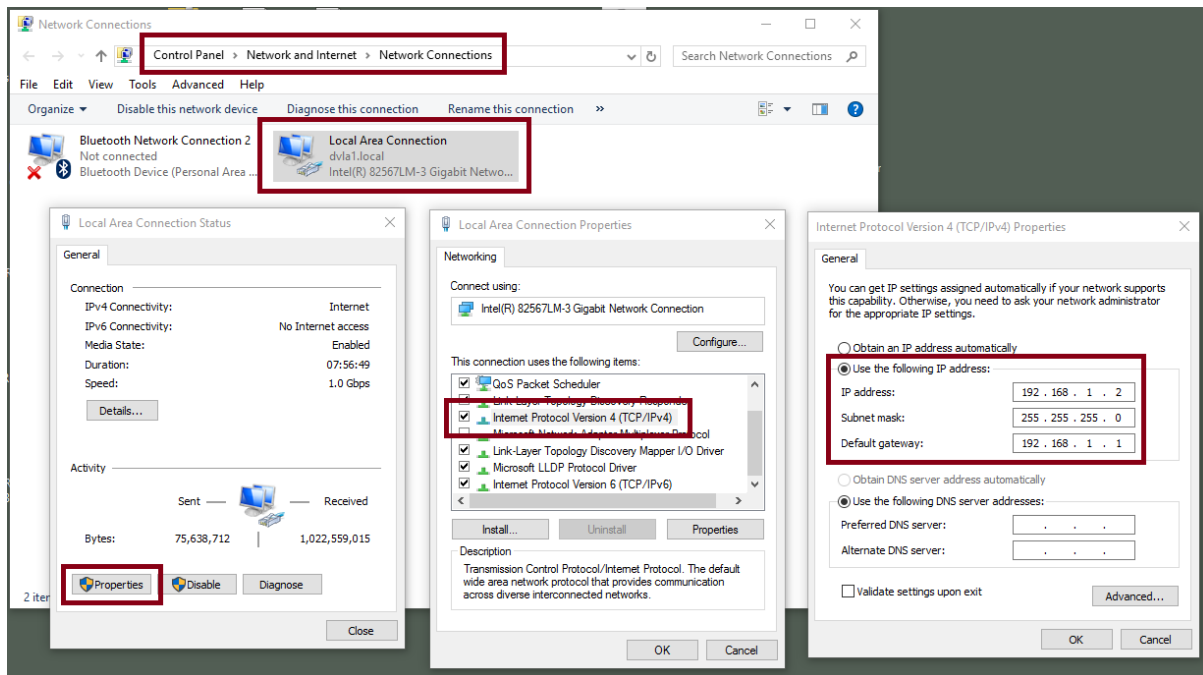
Troubleshooting the Network Connection

Connect the iCast 10NDI to the network then use the IP Finder utility program to scan for the device. If not found, it is possible that your network is not assigning IP addresses. Reasons of this are outlined as follows:

- The Router or the DHCP server is not connected to the network.
- New devices are blocked by the network administrator.
- Anti-virus software or the firewall blocks the communication.

1. Solve the problem by trying the following:
 - Turn off the router, wait for 10 seconds then turn on the router again.
 - Reset the iCast 10NDI’s network setting to the factory default:
 - Turn off iCast 10NDI.
 - Push the **Record and Stream** buttons simultaneously while turning on the iCast 10NDI’s power.
 - Wait for about five seconds and release the buttons as soon as you see the **RECORD** and **STREAM** button LEDs light up.

- Reboot the PC.
2. If the problem still persists, try the following ways:
 - Temporarily shut down the anti-virus software or firewall.
 - Make sure no other devices are connected to the LAN (wired or wireless) because this may result in IP conflicts.
 3. After trying all methods and if the problem is still not solved, the iCast 10NDI's video streaming server offers the fixed IP feature that allows you to establish point-to-point connection to gain access to the device without a DHCP server. Please note that the iCast 10NDI's default IP address is 192.168.1.201. Follow the steps outlined below.
 - Restore the iCast 10NDI's default network settings.
 - Turn off the device.
 - Push the **Record and Stream** buttons simultaneously while turning on the device's power.
 - Wait for about five seconds then release the buttons as soon as you see the **RECORD** and **STREAM** button LEDs light up.
 - Connect your PC to iCast 10NDI directly using an Ethernet cable (not necessarily a crossover cable).
 - Click START located at the bottom left corner of your PC screen.
 - On the text bar, enter Network Connections then click the icon that appears.
 - Double click the network adapter that connects your PC or laptop to the iCast 10NDI.
 - Click the "**Properties**" button.
 - Select "**Internet Protocol Version 4 (TCP/IPv4)**" and click the "**Properties**" button.
 - Check "**Obtain an IP address automatically**".
 - Enter IPv4 settings:
 - IP Address: 192.168.1.2
 - Subnet Mask: 255.255.255.0 (System default is 255.255.255.0)
 - Default Gateway: Not required for point-to-point connection.



- The iCast 10NDI should now be connected with an IP address of 192.168.1.201.

Advanced Troubleshooting

Try the following if you still are unable to connect:

- Use the ARP table to search for iCast 10NDI's MAC address; the MAC address can be found on the print label at the bottom of your device.
- MAC address starts with **00:07:36:03:xx:xx**.
- On the command prompt (terminal on MAC OS), enter **"arp -a"** then press enter key to display an ARP list. See if the iCast 10NDI is successfully connected to the network.
- Execute **services.msc**, and on the right column of the **"Services"** window, locate **"DHCP Client"** then click **"Restart"**.
- On the command prompt, enter **ipconfig/flushdns** followed by **ipconfig/release** or **ipconfig/renew**.

5.2 Source

In Source, you will be able to view and select various video source types (SDI, HDMI, IP Stream, NDI, WebRTC and UVC) for each input video channel.

On each source type page, you will also be able to view information of all five input video channels such as **Input Information**, **Video Source**, **Audio Source**, **Resolution**, **Frame Rate**, **Channels**, **Bits Per Sample** and **Sample Frequency**.

Note: The iCast 10NDI web UI does not update automatically so to learn the latest device status, please refresh the page manually.

SDI

The SDI Source page is shown below. Please note that the SDI video source type is only available on input video channel 1.

HDMI

For HDMI sources, you will be allowed to adjust the source video's brightness, contrast, hue and saturation by dragging the corresponding sliders as shown in the diagram below. Please note that the HDMI video source type is available across input video channels 1 – 4.

NDI

NDI (Network Device Interface) is an open protocol developed by NewTek to enable video compatible products to share video across a local area network. The full bandwidth NDI is not supported by iCast 10NDI. Instead, iCast 10NDI only offers NDI|HX which is basically a low bandwidth version of NDI.

If your video is delivered from NDI cameras, simply select the source from the Group drop-down menu then set the delay duration. Please note that NDI cameras and iCast 10NDI must be on the same network and only up to three input video channels can be set to the NDI video source type.

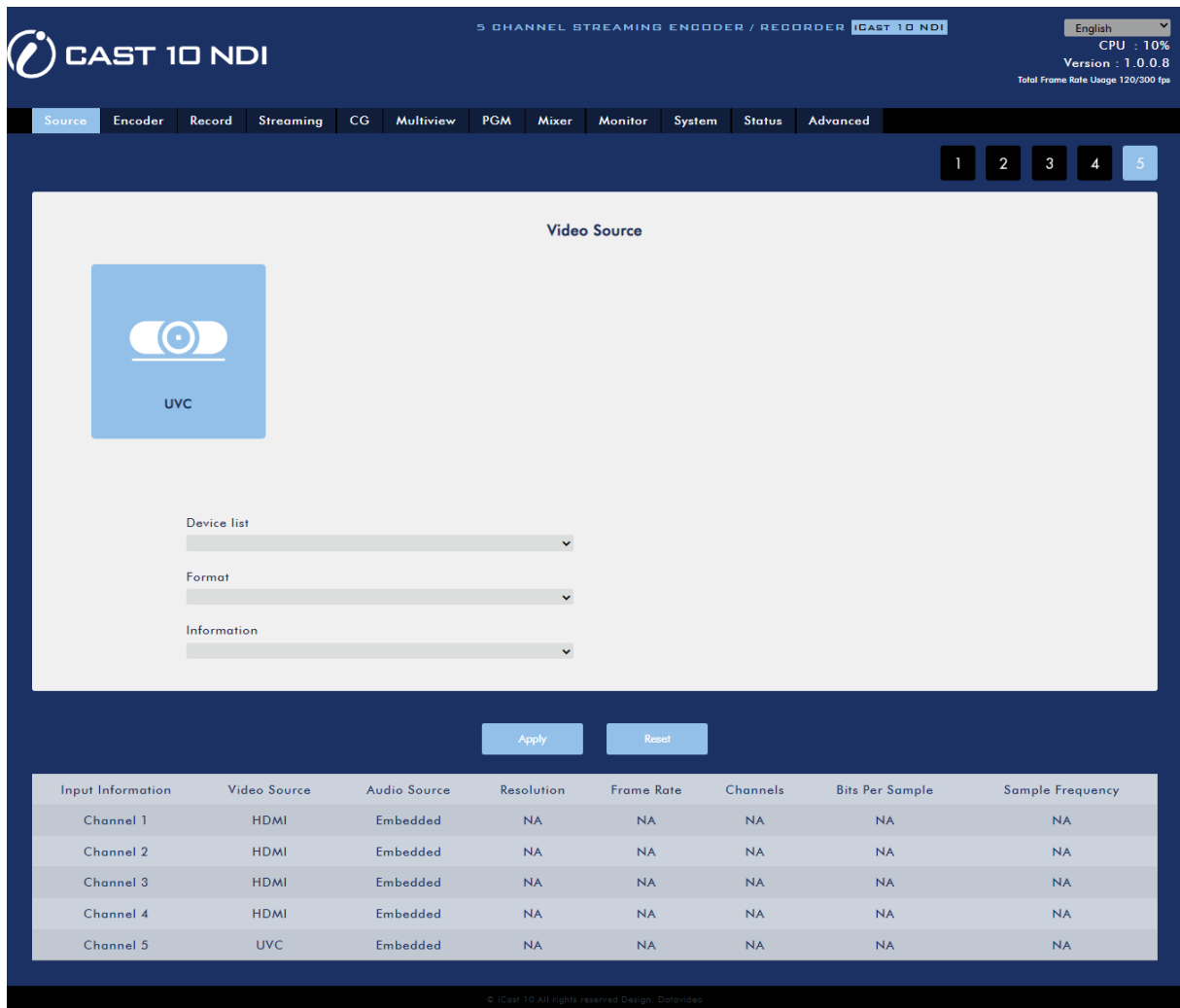

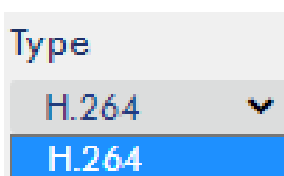
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5.3 Encoder

The iCast 10NDI has two video encoding engines allowing you to concurrently stream and record to multiple destinations over different protocols. The configurable encoder settings are **Encoder Type**, **Resolution**, **Frame Rate**, **Profile**, **Level**, **Entropy**, **GOP**, **Video Bitrate (bps)** and **Audio Bitrate (bps)** which will be detailed in this section.

Type



The H.264 video codec is a technology that encodes your raw footage so the file isn't massive and then decodes it for playback.

Before setting your encoder, make sure you have sufficient bandwidth. See the table below for the required bandwidth for H.264 video streaming at various resolutions.

Resolution	H.264/AVC Bandwidth Required
480p	1.5 Mbps
720p	3 Mbps
1080p	6 Mbps

Resolution

Once you've chosen your encoder, the first step of encoder setup is to adjust the image size. It is best to either match your original video source or scale it down. For example, capture at HD 720 and stream at HD 720 or capture at HD 720 and stream at 540 (high).

You should never be scaling up and streaming at a higher resolution than your original video source. For example, it does not make sense to capture at 720 and stream at 1080. Note that you will also have no gain in quality and you are using more bandwidth than is necessary for your viewers.

You should also be aware that higher resolutions require greater processing power to encode the stream. Attempting too high of a resolution on too little processing power can result in degraded image quality and corrupted or interrupted streams or recordings.

Resolutions available for your stream encoder are listed as follows:

Frame Rate

Select a frame rate from the drop-down menu for video streaming. Note that frame rate should always match the frame rate of the video source.

Profile

Profile sets the H.264 encoding profile for your stream. The available options are **Baseline**, **Main**, and **High**. Typically, **High** profile provides the best image quality and is suitable in most instances.

However, depending on the decoder used when viewing the stream, such as with mobiles devices, a Main or Baseline profile may be required.

Level

Levels specify the size of the video a decoder must be able to handle. They specify a maximum bit-rate for the video and a maximum number of macroblocks per second. Level is a hardcoded inaccessible parameter fixed at 4.2.

Entropy

There are two coding options available for generating H.264 content:

- CAVLC (Context-Adaptive Variable Length Coding)
- CABAC (Context-based Adaptive Binary Arithmetic Coding)

CABAC encoding provides a 7-10% quality improvement over CAVLC but requires an extra 10-15% CPU. CABAC encoding is only available in H.264 Profiles Main & High. When targeting at low-powered devices, such as older cell phones and tablets, we recommend the Baseline Profile that uses CAVLC which requires less computing power.

GOP

GOP pattern with longer GOP length encodes video very efficiently. Shorter GOP lengths usually work better with video that has quick movements, but they do not compress the data rate as much. Depending on your applications, you can select 16 GOP sizes ranging from 1 to 255.

Video Bitrate (bps)

The bitrate of the video specifies the amount of information stored in the video. The higher the bitrate is, the clearer the video is. However, when choosing your encoder settings for streaming, you should first check your available upload bandwidth. A good rule of thumb is for the bitrate of your stream to use no more than 50% of your available upload bandwidth capacity on a **DEDICATED** line. For example, if the result you get from a speed test shows that you have 2Mbps of upload speed available, your combined audio and video bitrate should not exceed 1Mbps.

The Record page allows you to set the two built-in recorders on iCast 10NDI. First select an encoder configured previously on the Encoder page then enter the record file name, select the file type and set the record duration.

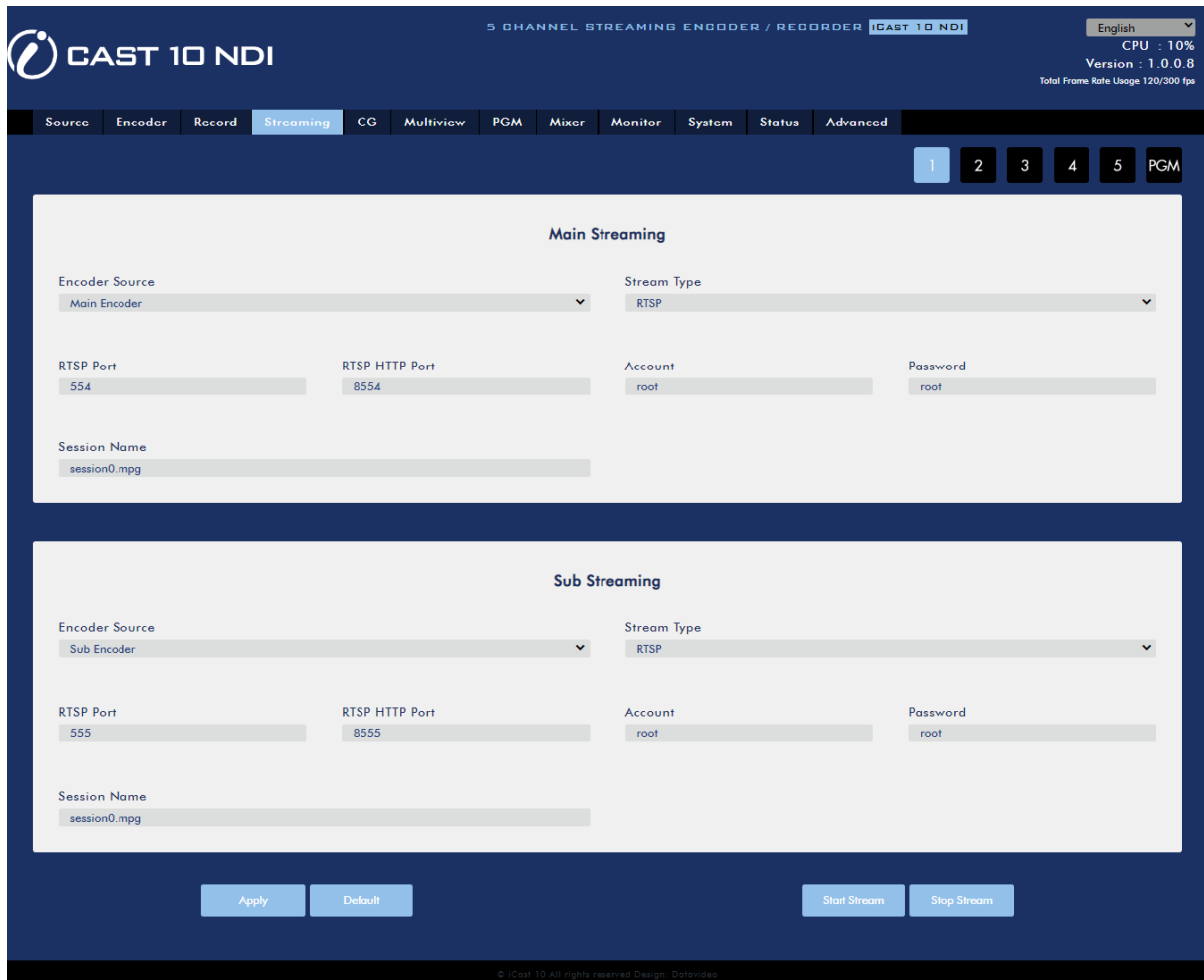

5.5 Streaming

The Streaming page allows you to select the two built-in streaming encoders for each input video channel on iCast 10NDI to deliver the respective channel videos to client devices via various video streaming protocols such as **RTSP, RTMP, TS, HLS, NDI, SRT, and DV Cloud**. First select an encoder configured previously on the Encoder page then the stream type and configure the settings accordingly.

Various stream type settings will be discussed in this section.

Please note that each input video channel is equipped with two built-in encoders so you can deliver the channel video to two destinations using two different streaming protocols at the same time. In addition, you can also borrow encoders from other input video channels. For example, you can assign Main Encoder of Channel 3 to stream Channel 1 video via the configured streaming protocol. See [Section 5.12 Advanced](#) for more details.

5.6 CG

The CG function allows the user to place scrolling texts (News), a still picture (Graphic), a logo and an animated image above the video layer. Various CG layers will be discussed in this section.

News

News allows you to place the scrolling text over the video.

First pre-enter the scrolling text content into a text file then upload the text file to iCast 10NDI. Lastly, customize the following text properties.

Note: You can only enter up to 15 lines of text into the text file only and for Chinese text, please set the font type to UTF-8.

Size: Set the font size to large, medium or small.

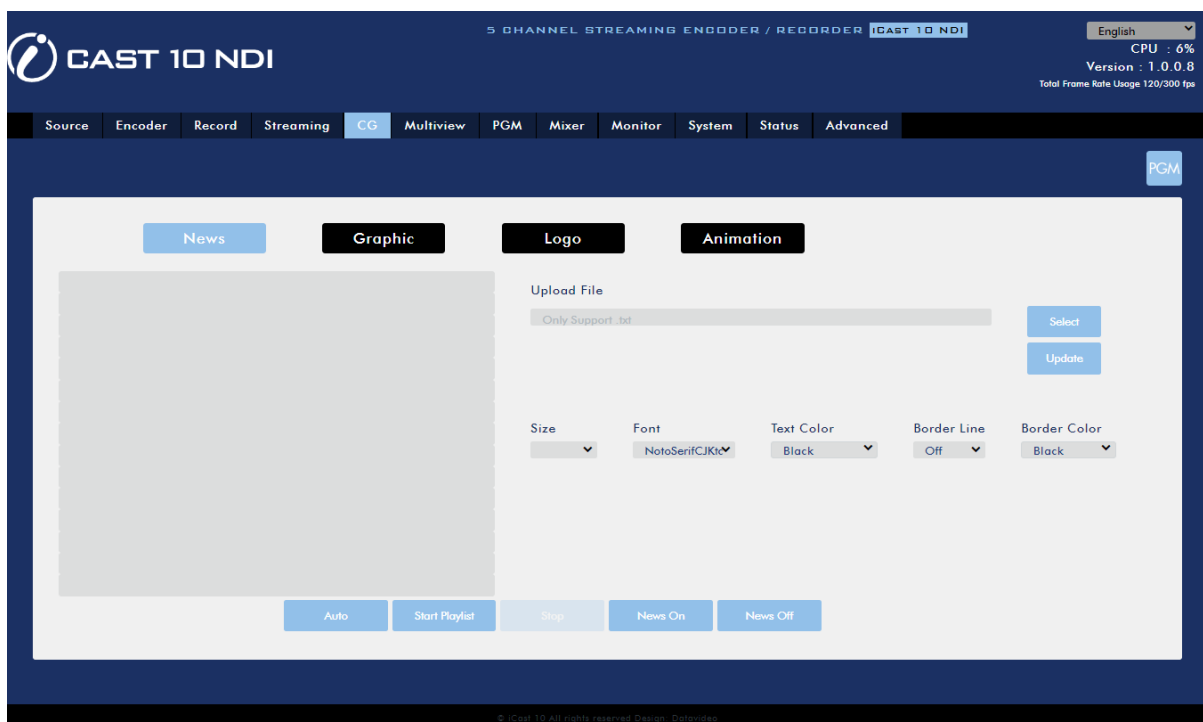

Font: NotoSerifCJKtc and Open are the two available font types.

Text Color: You can set the text color to Black, Blue, Green, Orange, Red, White or Yellow.

Border Line: Select ON to enable the border line of the text entered.

Border Color: The border line color can be set to Black, White or Yellow.



After you've entered and configured the scrolling text, you may enable them on the video using one of the three ways described below:

Click "**AUTO**" to play the scrolling text and change lines for every 6 seconds.

Click "**Start Playlist**" to play the scrolling text and change lines only when the space key is pressed. At the 15th line (last line), press the space key to return to the first line.

Click "**News On**" to select any text preview box with the mouse. When the text line turns red as the mouse cursor is hovered over, that particular line of text is too long and certain parts have been cropped on the screen.

Graphic

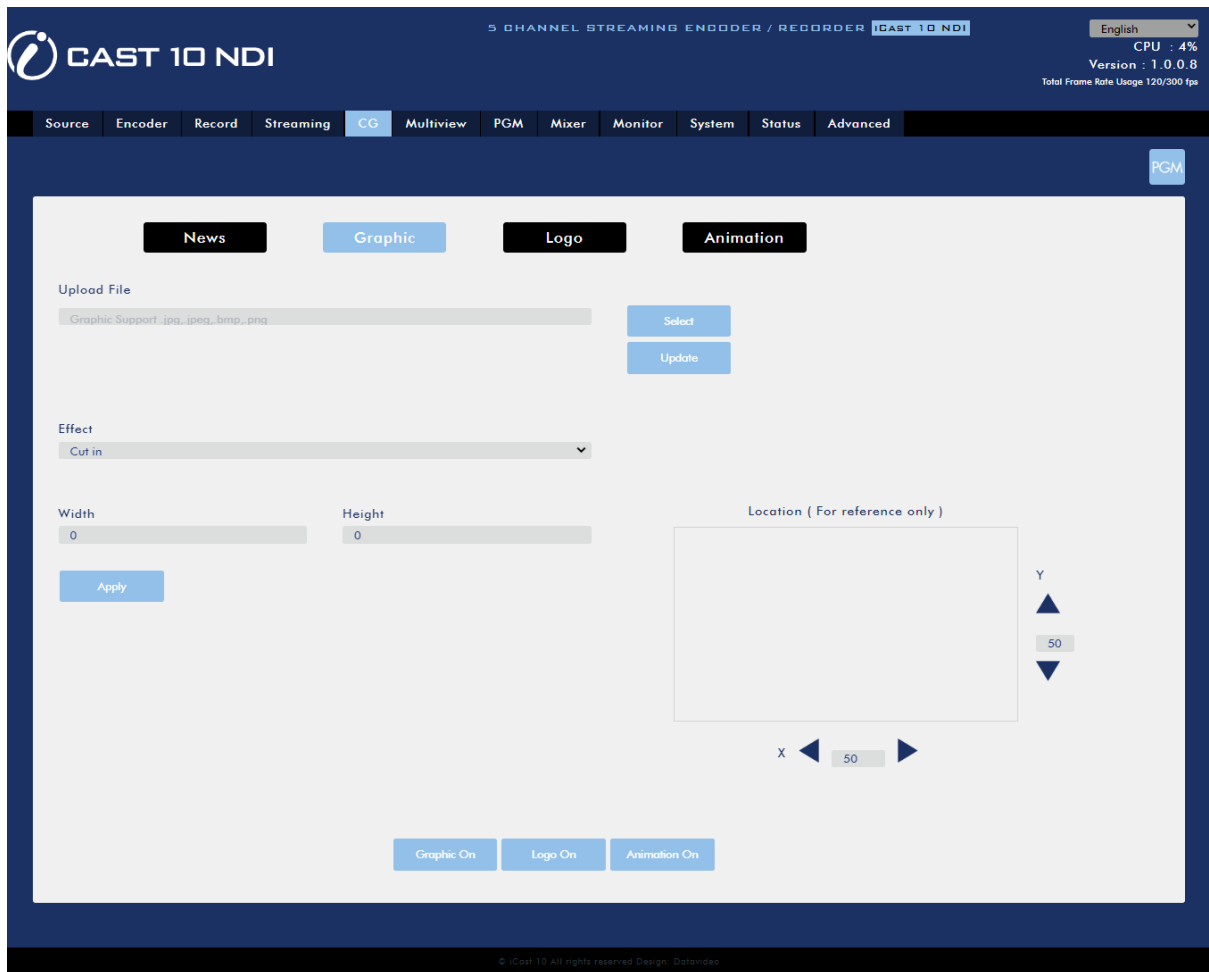
You can also add a picture to the video. You will be required to select a png file from your local hard disk. Click **Select** to browse the hard drive for your graphic file then click **Update** to start the upload.

After the graphic file has been successfully uploaded, you can adjust the size by entering appropriate values in the **Width** and **Height** fields.

The **Effect** drop-down list sets how the image enters the video. Select "**Cut in**" if you want the image to appear with no effect. If you want the image to enter from either side of the screen, select "**Left to Right**" or "**Right to Left**".

Lastly, set the coordinates of the image. The position of the image on the screen will be shown in the location box.

To turn on the graphic image, simply click the **Graphic ON** button which can be found at the bottom of the page.

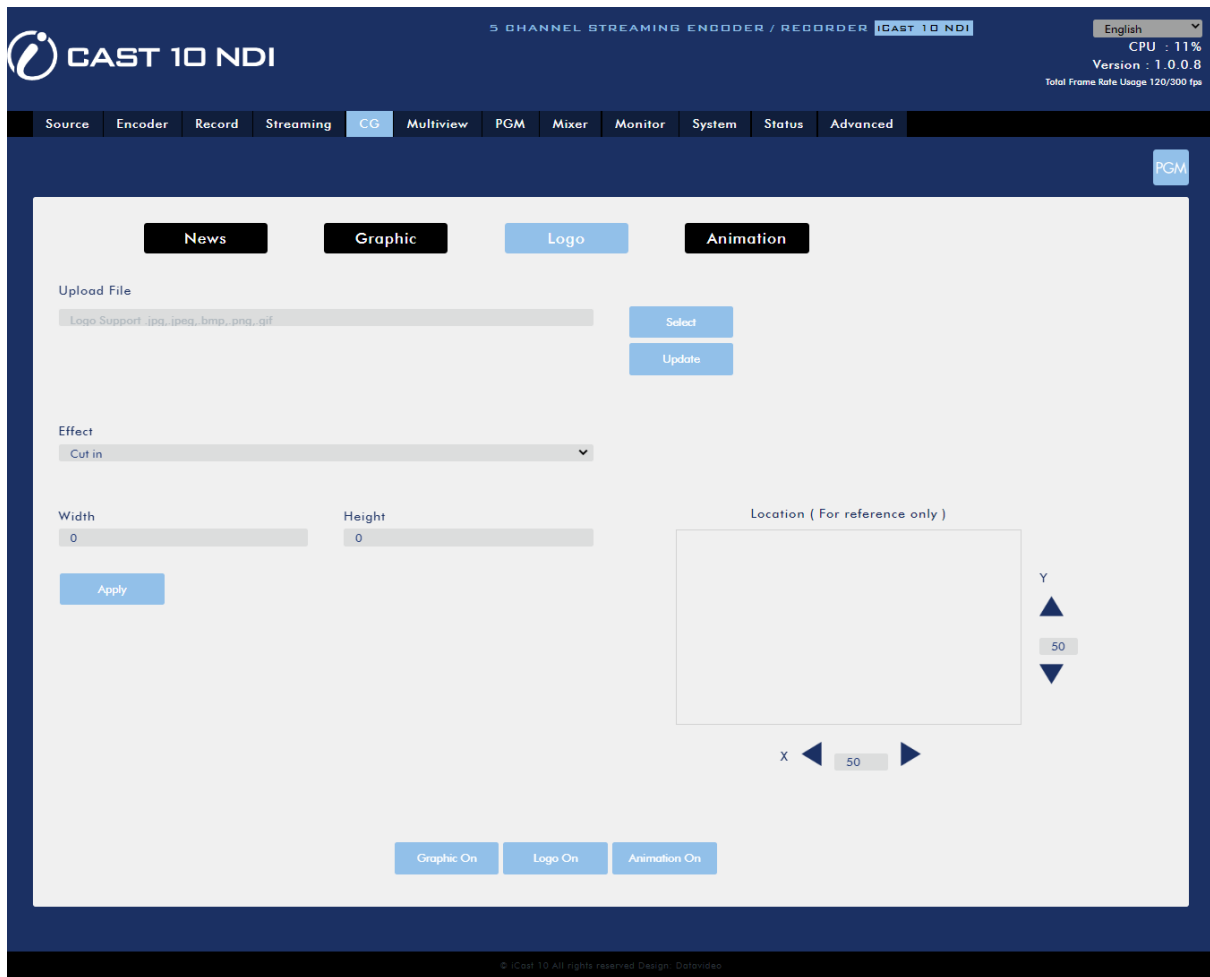

Animation

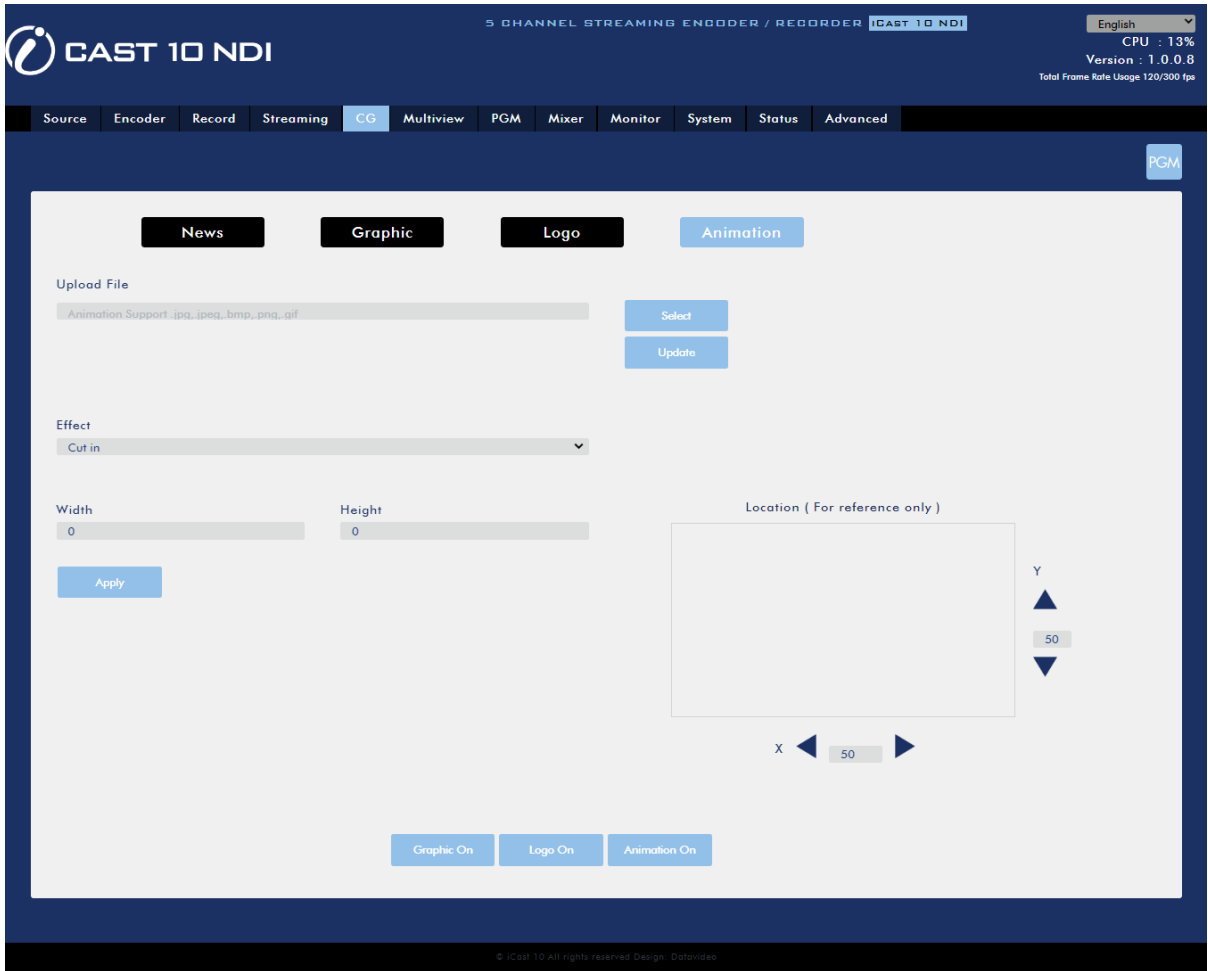

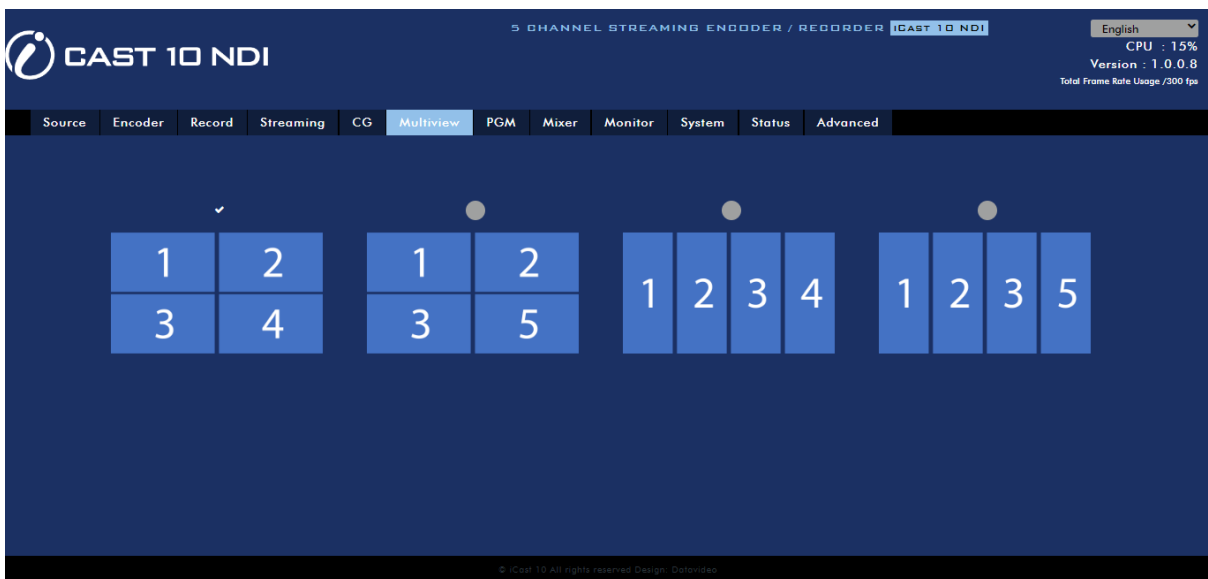

5.8 PGM

The PGM page allows you to set the Program OUT screen layout. The available layout options are Quad View, Full Screen, POP, Side By Side and PIP.

Quad View

In Quad View mode, the Program OUT screen will be switched to either a 2x2 or 4x1 Multiview layout. The corresponding program out buttons of the displayed input channels will illuminate red (1/2/3/4 or 5). Since the fourth quadrant is shared by channels 4 and 5, only the selected channel button will illuminate red and the unselected will illuminate white.



The input channel displayed in the fourth quadrant can be changed by clicking the respective layout icons as depicted in the diagram below. Alternatively, you can also press the respective MV button located on the front panel to switch between channels 4 and 5.

5.13 Advanced

In Advanced, you will be allowed to select up to 10 separate streams for an input channel.

First select the input video channel from the **Video Source** drop-down menu then check the stream servers that you would like to use to deliver the channel video to your viewers. Stream 1 corresponds to main and sub stream servers of input video channel 1, stream 2 corresponds to main and sub stream servers of input video channel 2, and so forth.

The encoders can be configured on the Encoder page. See [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) for details.

Chapter 6 Video Streaming and Recording

The iCast 10NDI five channel all-in-one streaming switcher allows the user to stream and record your program at the same time. From any SDI/HDMI input sources, the video streaming server generates an H.264 encoded stream that is compliant with RTSP or RTMP protocols. While encoding the video at bit rates appropriate for live streaming, the video streaming server concurrently records a high-quality MP4 file to a 2.5” hard disk. **Please note that MP4 files can be played on most devices but if any parts of the file is corrupted, you will then not be able to play back the entire video.**

6.1 Video Streaming

In this section, we will discuss how you can play the video using different streaming protocols and how to place texts on your video. For configuration of the streaming encoders and information about various streaming protocols, see [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) and [Section 5.5 Streaming](#).

RTSP/TS/HLS

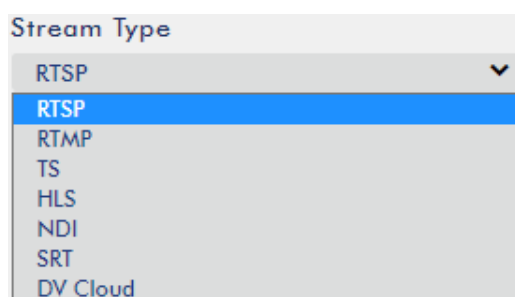
The stream server allows any client device to connect and playback your video stream in **RTSP, TS or HLS** mode.



The following operation procedure uses VLC media player to playback video stream. If your PC or laptop does not have VLC media player installed, please visit VideoLAN’s official homepage (<https://www.videolan.org/>) and download the installation file then install the program.

Follow the steps below to obtain the RTSP URL:

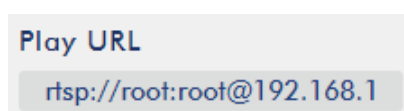
1. On the web UI, click the “**Streaming**” tab to open the stream settings page.
2. Select a stream engine then the encoder from the **Encoder Source** drop-down menu. See [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) for setup of main and sub encoders.
3. Select **RTSP** from the **Stream Type** drop-down menu.



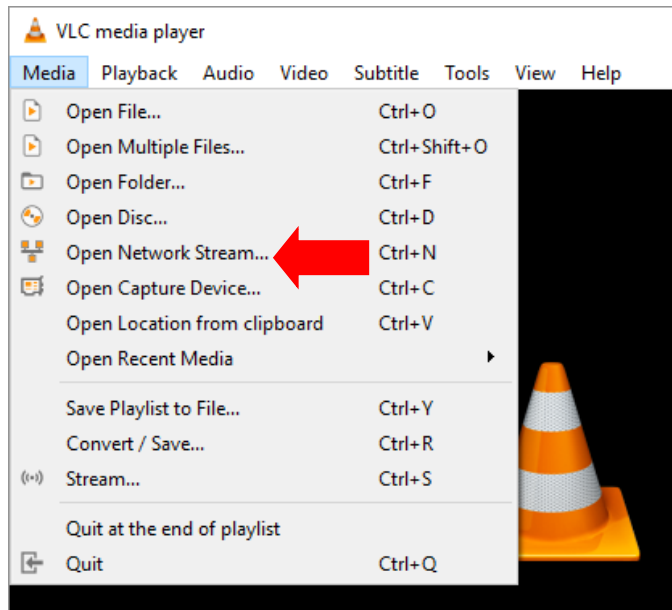
4. Click the **Start Stream** button to generate the RTSP URL.



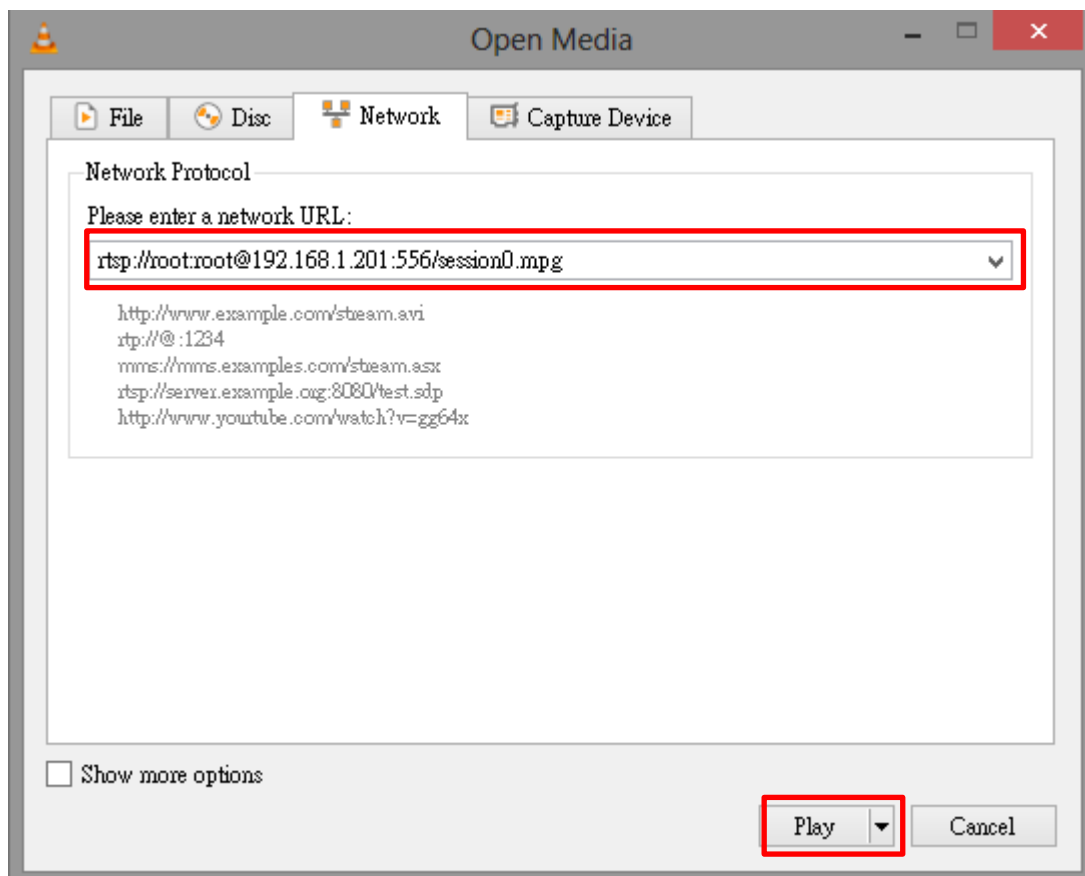
5. Based on your settings, the device will automatically generate the RTSP URL **rtsp://root:root@192.168.1.201:556/session0.mpg**.



- To view the RTSP video stream, enter the RTSP URL into the client device.
- Open VLC then click **Open Network Stream** (shown in the diagram below).

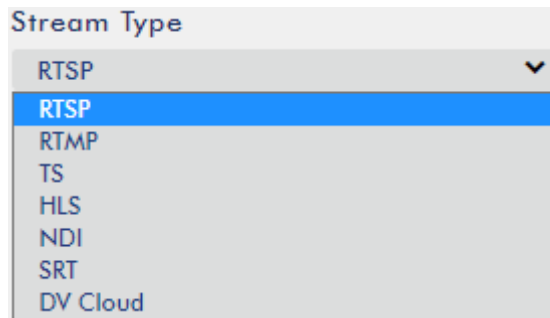


- As shown in the diagram below, enter the stream URL then click **Play** to start streaming.

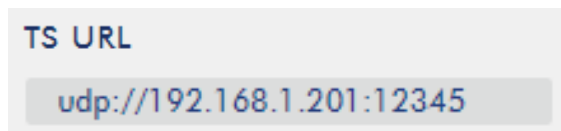


Follow the steps below to obtain the TS URL:

1. On the web UI, click the “**Streaming**” tab to open the stream settings page.
2. Select a stream engine then the encoder from the **Encoder Source** drop-down menu. See [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) for setup of main and sub encoders.
3. Select **TS** from the **Stream Type** drop-down menu.



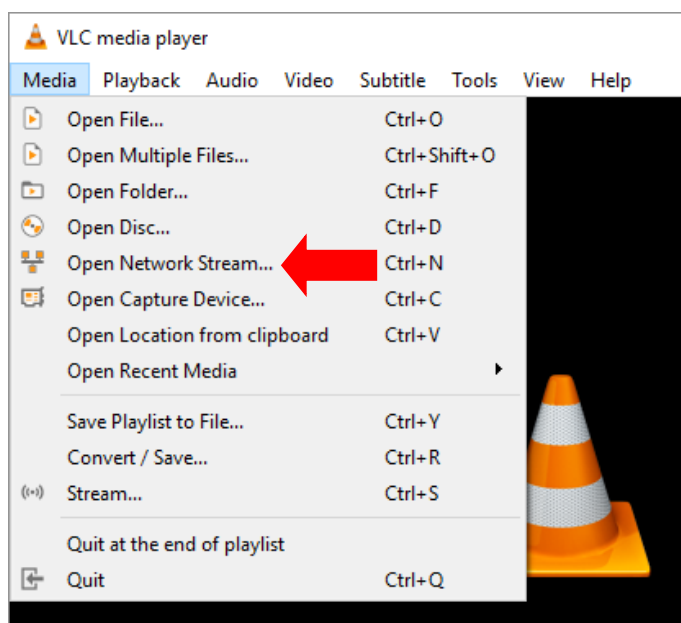
4. Enter the TS URL. Note that the TS URL shown below is only for illustration purpose.



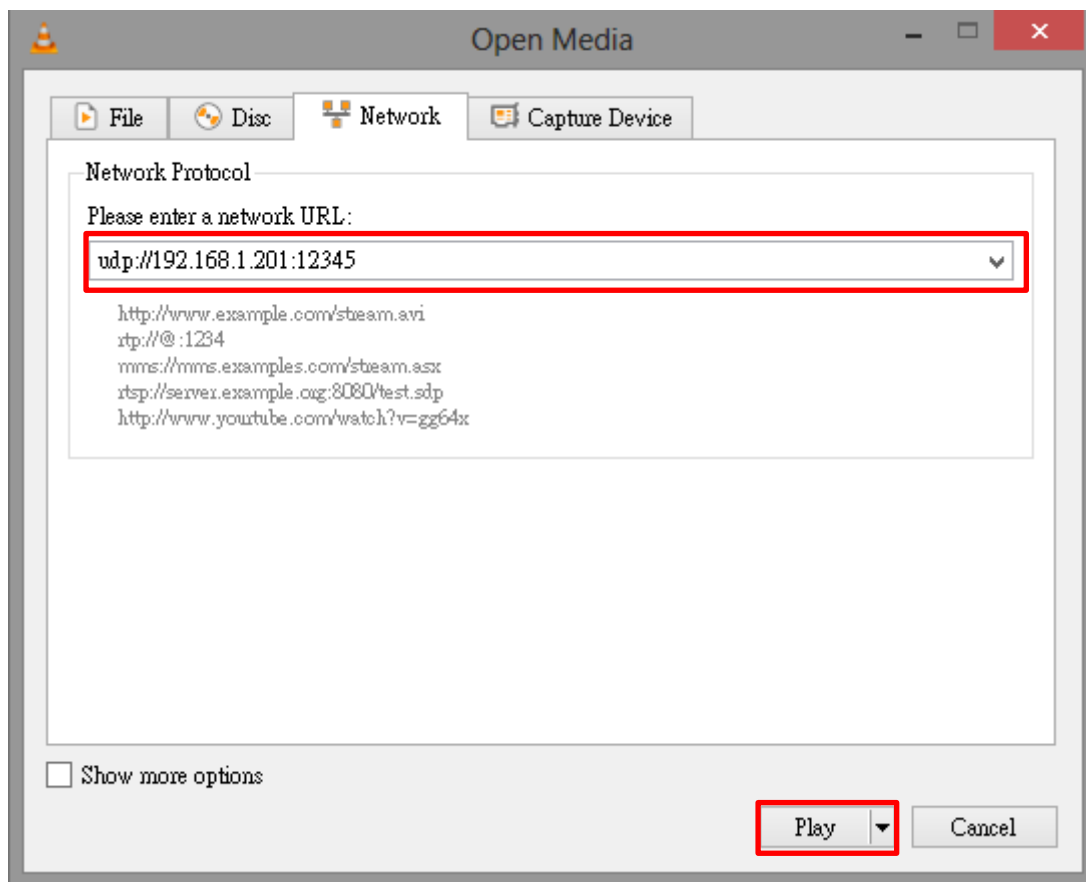

7. On the computer, open VLC then click **Open Network Stream** (shown in the diagram below).

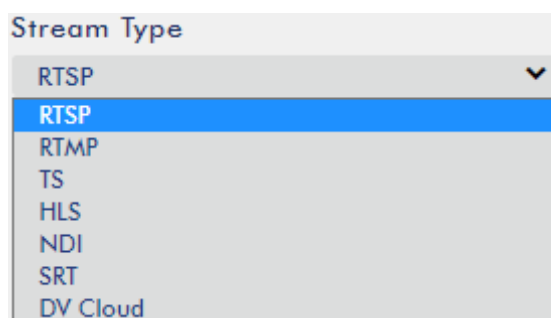

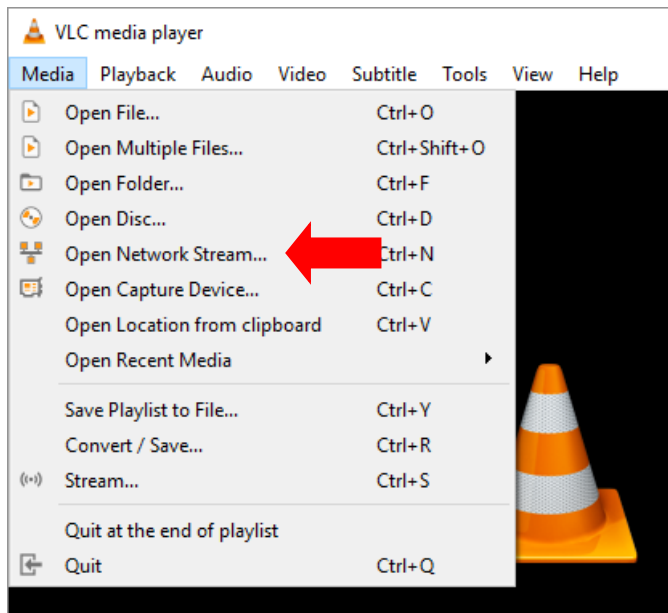

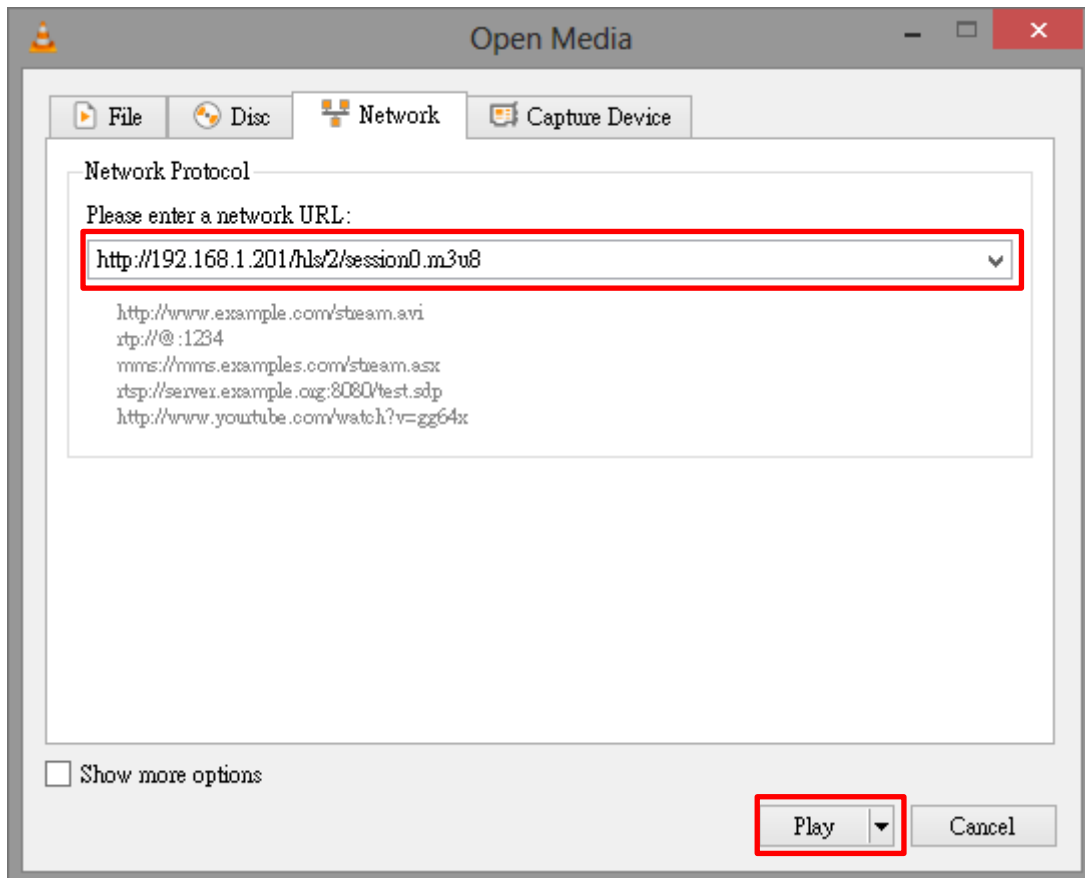
- On the web UI, click the **“Streaming”** tab to open the stream settings page.

- Select **HLS** from the **Stream Type** drop-down menu.



- Click the **Start Stream** button to start the stream.
- Based on your settings, the device will automatically generate a .m3u8 stream URL:

- Enter the **HLS** URL into the client device.
- Open VLC then click **Open Network Stream** (shown in the diagram below).



8. As shown in the diagram below, enter the stream URL then click **Play** to start streaming.



9. You can also play .m3u8 stream URL using the devices listed as follows:

- iPhone, iPad and MacBook: Use Safari to open the .m3u8 stream URL.
- Windows 10: Use Microsoft Edge to open the .m3u8 stream URL.

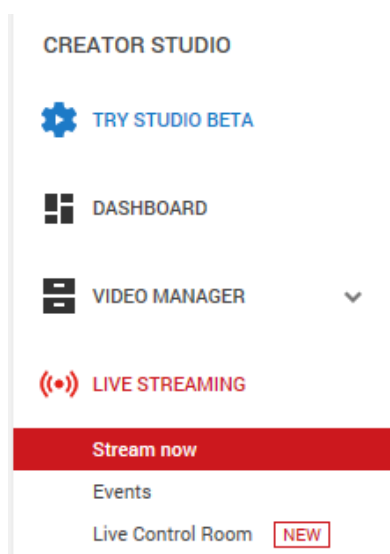
RTMP

In the **RTMP** mode, the iCast 10NDI can send up to two data streams to multiple CDNs or media servers that support the **Real-Time Messaging Protocol**. Examples of the **RTMP** media server are **USTREAM** and **Youtube**.

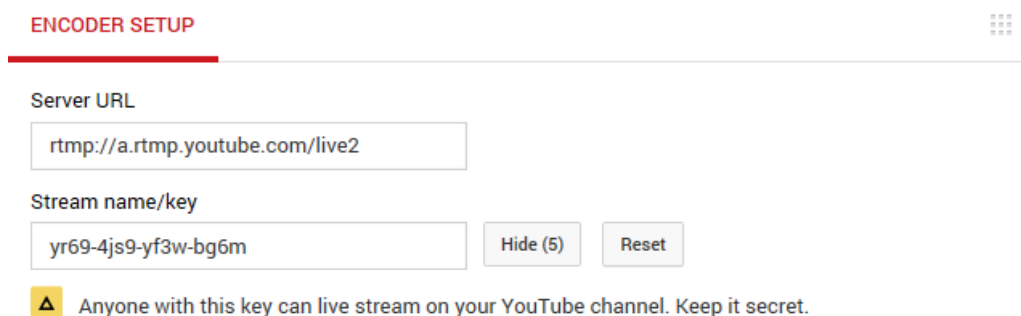
Note: The iCast 10NDI does not support RTMP local.

In this section, we will show you how to set up an **RTMP** stream to **Youtube**. The step-by-step account setup is outlined as follows:

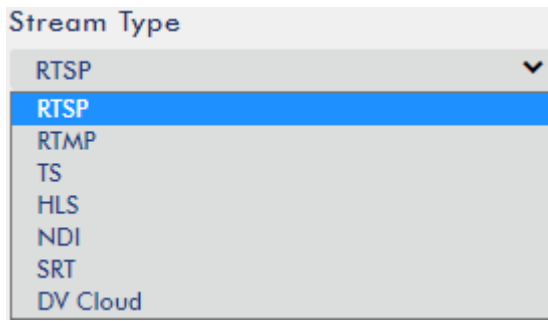
1. First, obtain the Server URL and Stream name/key from Youtube.
2. Open the Youtube Live Dashboard https://www.youtube.com/live_dashboard
3. On the left column, locate and click “**Stream now.**”



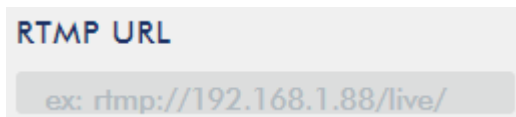
4. On the right, scroll down to the bottom where you will be able to find **Server URL** and **Stream name/key**.



5. On the iCast 10NDI, open the **Streaming** page.
6. Select a stream engine then the encoder from the **Encoder Source** drop-down menu. See [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) for setup of main and sub encoders.
7. Select **RTMP** from the Stream Type drop-down menu.



8. Enter the **Server URL** (`rtmp://a.rtmp.youtube.com/live2`) obtained from the **Youtube Live Streaming** page into the **RTMP URL** field.



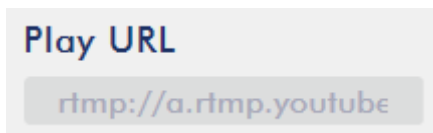
9. Enter the **Stream name/key** (`yr69-4js9-yf3w-bg6m`) obtained from the **Youtube Live Streaming** page into the **StreamName** field.



10. As required by the live streaming channel, enter your Youtube account name and password into the **Account** and **Password** fields.



11. Click the **Start Stream** button to start streaming the live video to the **Youtube Live**. You should also see an **RTMP URL** generated.



12. At this point, you should be able to view your stream video on Youtube.
13. To stop live streaming, simply click the **Stop Stream** button.

SRT

When setting up an SRT stream on iCast 10NDI, you can configure it as an SRT source encoder (caller mode) or an SRT destination decoder (listener mode).

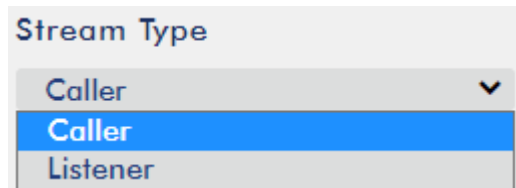
To establish an SRT link between the source and destination devices, ensure that one device is a Listener and the other is a Caller. The device you set as the caller or listener is entirely arbitrary.

To access the device's SRT settings, log in to the web UI, select the **"Streaming"** tab, then **follow the steps below to set up the SRT traffic:**

1. Select a stream engine then the encoder from the **Encoder Source** drop-down menu. See [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) for setup of main and sub encoders.
2. Select **SRT** from the first **Stream Type** drop-down menu.



3. Locate the second **Stream Type** drop-down menu in which you will be able to set the device to the Caller (source) or Listener (destination) mode.



- a. If Caller is selected, do the following:
 - In the **IP Address and SRT Port** fields, enter the IP address and the port number of the destination device (decoder) respectively. If your SRT stream destination is a CDN or media server, the IP address and the port number should be provided by the service provider.
 - In the **Latency** field, enter the amount of latency to apply to the stream. The default value is 1000 ms.
 - b. If Listener is selected, simply enter a port number that you intend to use on this device for the SRT stream.
4. Click the **Start Stream** button to start the SRT stream.

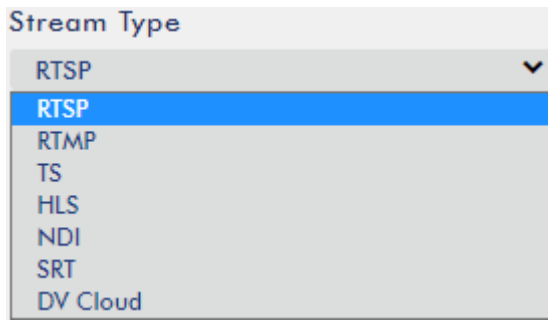
NDI

NDI (Network Device Interface) is an open protocol developed by NewTek to enable video compatible products to share video across a local area network. The full bandwidth NDI is not supported by iCast 10NDI. Instead, iCast 10NDI only offers NDI|HX which is basically a low bandwidth version of NDI.

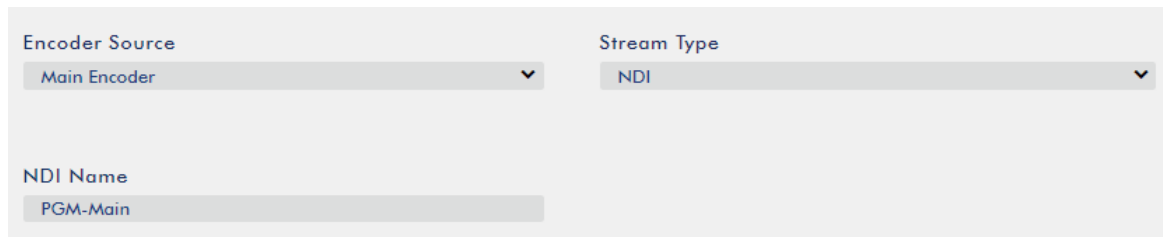
Before streaming to any NDI destination devices, you will need to first make sure the NDI video players and the iCast 10NDI are on the same network. Please also note that only one encoder (main or sub) will be enabled for the input video channel if NDI is chosen.

To access the device's NDI settings, log in to the web UI, select the **"Streaming"** tab, then **follow the steps below to set up the NDI traffic:**

1. Select a stream engine then the encoder from the **Encoder Source** drop-down menu. See [Section 5.3 Encoder](#) for setup of main and sub encoders.
2. Select **NDI** from the **Stream Type** drop-down menu. Please also note that only one encoder (main or sub) will be enabled for the input video channel if NDI is chosen.



3. Specify a name for your NDI encoder in the **NDI Name** field.



4. Click the **Start Stream** button to start the NDI stream.

6.2 Record/Stream Buttons

The **RECORD** and **STREAM** buttons on the front panel of the iCast 10NDI give the user certain controls of the record and stream functions. In this section, we will cover operations of these two buttons in detail.



Press and hold the **Record** button for at least one second to start/stop recording.

Press and hold the **Stream** button for at least one second to start/stop streaming.



Please note the following:

- If the Record or Stream button illuminates white, the function is turned off.
- If the Record or Stream button shows blinking red, the function is activating.
- If the Record or Stream button turns solid red, the device is recording or streaming.

During recording or streaming, if the **Stream** or **Record** button turns from solid red to blinking red, check the 2" LCD screen for error codes.

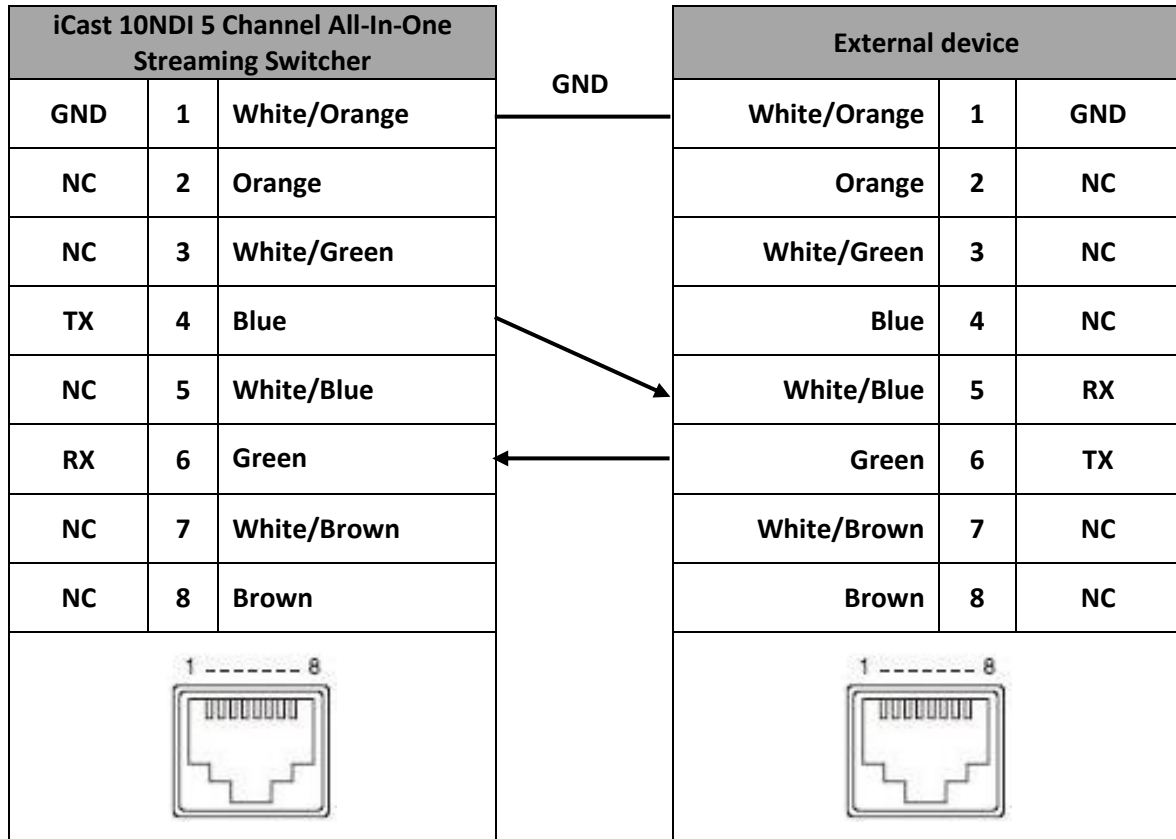
6.3 Restore Factory Defaults

On the system page of the web UI, scroll down to **System Control** in which you should be able to find the **Restore to Default** button. Click to restore the iCast 10NDI's factory defaults.

Appendix 1 Pinout Information for RS-232 Connectors

External devices such as remote controllers can be connected to the iCast 10NDI through the RS-232 interface using a custom Ethernet cable. The RS-232 connection wiring scheme is shown below.



Appendix 2 **Firmware Upgrade**

Datavideo usually releases new firmware containing new features or reported bug fixes from time to time. Customers can either download the iCast 10NDI firmware as they wish or contact their local dealer or reseller for assistance.

This section outlines the firmware upgrade process which should take **approximately 10 minutes to complete**. The existing iCast 10NDI settings should persist through the **firmware upgrade process, which should not be interrupted once started** as this could result in a non-responsive unit.


Successful firmware upgrade on iCast 10NDI requires:

- iCast 10NDI x 1
- 12V Power adapter x 1
- PC x 1
- Latest firmware file

Please remove the connected UVC device before you start the firmware update.

Update Procedure

1. Download the latest firmware files from the official product page.
2. Save the files on the PC.
3. Open the web UI then select System → Firmware Update

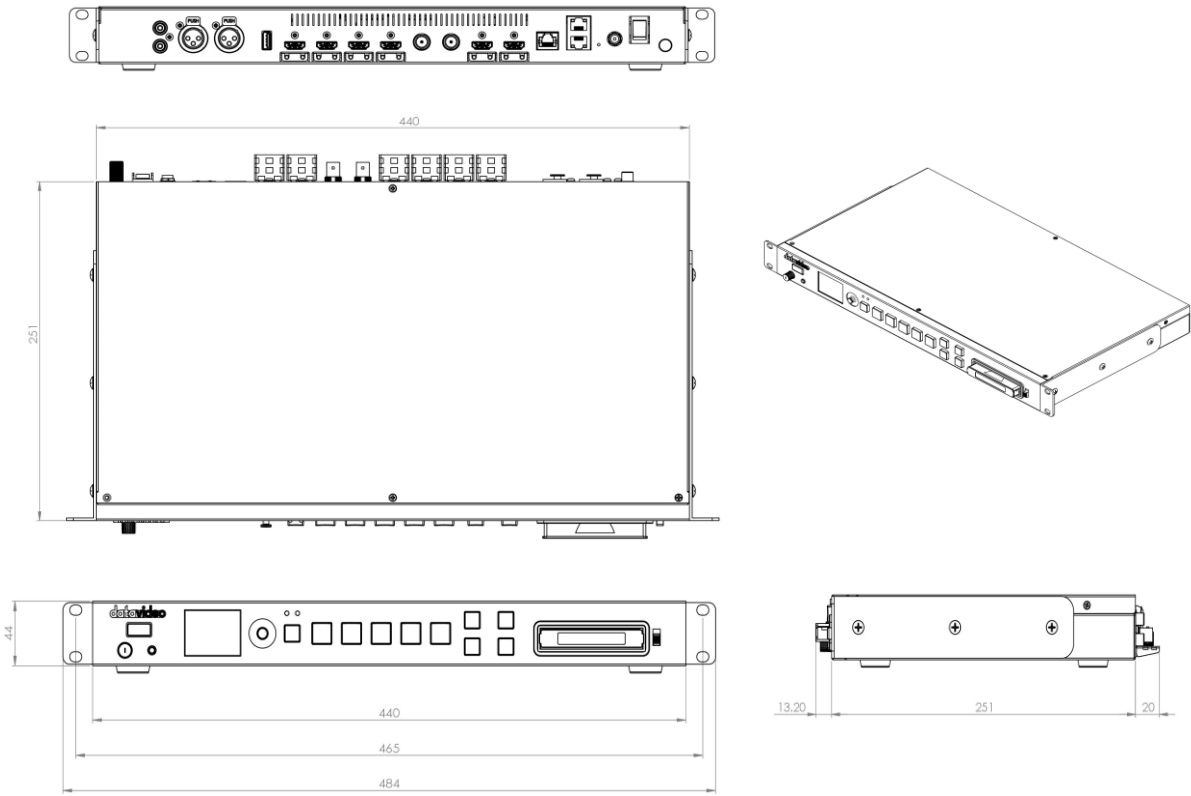
4. Click **Browse** to search for the latest firmware file saved on the PC's hard disk then upload the latest firmware file to iCast 10NDI.
