



# Advice on eye pain

Equipment			
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Procedure			
0	Introduce yourself and ask the patient's first and last name. and inform the purpose of asking the history		
1	Start with open-ended questions Use appropriate open/close questions. Do not use medical terminology/English. Do not ask multiple questions at the same time.		
2	The sequence of events is not confusing. Inform the patient when changing the subject of inquiry. Repeat periodically or ask again when necessary.		
3	Proper display of body language (eye contact, interested attitude, nod)		
4	Onset Sudden/gradual pain, blurred vision, red eyes, seeing rainbow halo around the lights (Rainbow halo)		
5	Photophobia: Family history of glaucoma. Headache/headache nausea and vomiting		
6	Eye irritation, eye irritation, eye accident		
7	Using drops or oral medications, such as steroids		
8	Differential diagnosis Acute anterior uveitis acute keratitis		
9	Diagnosis of acute attack glaucoma
